Derby City Local Plan – Part 1 Core Strategy Equalities Impact Assessment December 2015



1. Introduction to Equalities Impact Assessment (EqIA)

- 1.1 All local planning authorities are required to produce a set of documents collectively known as the 'Local Plan' which sets out the planning strategy and policies for an area. For Derby, the 'Core Strategy' will form the first part of a new Local Plan for the City. It will replace a number of remaining 'saved' policies of the current City of Derby Local Plan Review (2006). The Core Strategy sets out the Derby's proposed strategic policies and development proposals to deliver its vision for Derby up to 2028.
- 1.2 The Core Strategy is now considered to be ready for 'Submission' following a large number of consultation exercises stretching back to 2009 (see below). The 'Submission' version of the plan is the culmination of this consultation and reflects a significant and robust evidence base. This plan will now be subject to Examination by an independent Planning Inspector who will consider whether the strategy is legally compliant and 'sound'.
- 1.3 The Equality Act 2010 sets out the Public Sector Equality Duty (PSED) which requires public authorities to have due regard to certain equality considerations in carrying out their functions. The Act does not require an EqIA but, the presence of such an assessment is evidence that the PSED has been complied with.
- 1.2 The purpose of this 'Equality Impact Assessment' (EqIA) is to highlight the likely impact of the Core Strategy on characteristic groups and to take action, where necessary, to improve the policies.
- 1.3 The equality factors considered are:
 - Age
 - Disability
 - Gender
 - Marriage/Civil Partnership
 - Pregnancy/maternity
 - Race
 - Religion
 - Sexual equality
 - Low income

2. Core Strategy Preparation and Milestones

2.1 The process of the Core Strategy has been quite lengthy and has involved a number of consultation exercises (see diagram below).



2.2 Each stage has provided the community and other stakeholders to be involved in choosing the right strategy and planning policies for Derby. It has also provided an opportunity for the Council to consider the impacts and implications of delivering

- this strategy on different groups of people. The results of this consultation can be found in the Council's Regulation 22 statement. This will show the types of issues raised and how the Council has sought to address them through the process.
- 2.3 It is a priority of the Core Strategy to promote community cohesion, support regeneration, tackle deprivation and inequalities to create a sustainable community. The process the Council has gone through to get to this stage has been intended to generate policies which will make these objectives a reality. The plan is also required to meet the City's housing and employment needs by allocating land for development. Key objectives of the plan in terms of equalities are as follows:
 - To develop stronger, safer and more cohesive communities through the provision of quality housing, employment
 opportunities, education, health care, sport, recreation, leisure and community facilities to help ensure that everyone has
 equal life opportunities, feel they belong to their communities and are less likely to take part in anti-social behaviour or
 commit crime
 - To support the development of balanced communities by ensuring that new, well designed, sustainable residential development helps to meet the City's housing needs... including affordable housing and homes to meet the needs of our diverse communities, including older people and minority ethnic communities
 - To promote equality and community cohesion, healthy and active lifestyles and support improvements in community safety, particularly for children and young people.
 - To make best uses of existing infrastructure... and provision of new infrastructure, taking account of changes to our population including the needs of older people, children and young people
 - To strengthen the range and quality of Derby's cultural and learning opportunities and facilities by celebrating diversity, ensuring that the role of culture in the economy is better understood...
- 2.4 The Core Strategy has also been subject to an iterative process of sustainability appraisal (SA). SA considers the social, environmental and economic impacts of policies. The purpose behind this to promote 'sustainable development', making the plan as sustainable as possible, while still meeting the needs of the population. The SA also contains a number of objectives that are pertinent to the consideration of equality including:
 - To reduce deprivation and inequality
 - To reduce crime and promote safer and more cohesive communities

- To improve health, reduce health inequalities and increase levels of physical activity
- To create and maintain a prosperous and economically vibrant City that meets the varying needs of its residents
- To maximise people's accessibility to services and facilities
- 2.5 While the EqIA is more broadly based than the SA, there is considerable synergy between the SA and the assessment of equality impacts. The policies assessed in this document have been through an extensive and iterative process and have been refined taking into account issues raised through consultation, the extensive evidence base underpinning the strategy and SA.

3. Scoping

3.1 Initial screening of the policies to ascertain the degree of relevance to the identified equality factor and whether there is a requirement for an Impact Assessment was carried out. It was considered that a number of the proposed policies could have some impact on one or more of the defined equality factors and so an Impact Assessment was carried out.

4. Assessment

- 3.1 Each policy was considered against each equality factor for its potential impact and was scored on a red/yellow/green system for adverse/neutral/positive impact. Where other than a neutral impact was found, comments were made detailing the particular effect. This was considered appropriate considering the high level strategic nature of the plan and the likelihood of any individual policy impacting on a specific identified group. Although a number of the policies were considered not to have an effect on equality factors they are included in the assessment table for completeness.
- 3.2 Table 1 provides the assessment of the policies.

4. Conclusions

4.1 As can be seen, the assessment did not identify any particular concerns in terms of negative impacts on specific sectors of the community. This is not surprising as the policies have been through extensive consultation and assessment. Policies have evolved over time to address any concerns raised and appropriate mitigation added where necessary.

- 4.2 The only specific negative impact identified relates to the potential loss of a specific facility used by one particular section of the community. It was recognised at an early stage the regeneration of Castleward might result in the loss of an existing community's facilities. However, this has been appropriately addressed within the policy by ensuring that the regeneration will deliver appropriate replacement community facilities.
- 4.3 It should be remembered that the underlying objectives of the Plan and SA have been in place since early in the plan making process and thus the policies have been drafted to ensure that they are consistent with these aims. The Council is comfortable that the policy framework produced does not have any unacceptable impact on equalities.

5. Monitoring and Review

- 5.1 Both the SA and Core Strategy contain suggested monitoring regimes to ensure the policies are being delivered. Of particular relevant to the impact on equalities will be:
 - Index of multiple deprivation scores (or equivalent)
 - Gaps in the level of deprivation between best and worst performing areas
 - Provision of infrastructure with community benefits in conjunction with new development
 - Affordable housing secured
 - Housing secured to Part M4(2) and Part M4(3) standards
 - Net additional dwellings per year
 - · Skills and qualification statistics
 - · Life expectancy and long term health statistics
 - Provision of open space and sports facilities
 - Number and frequency of bus routes & patronage
 - · Health of local shopping facilities
 - Net change in school places
 - Net change in employment
- 5.2 The results of this monitoring will be published annually by the Council following adoption of the Plan.
