More children with serious illnesses and disabilities are surviving into adulthood and the infant mortality rate has fallent oless than a quarter of what it was at hebeginning of the 1960s.

suffermuchworseoutcomes. The variation in outcomes and quality of health careforchildre nandyoung people is unacceptable. The clear evidence that pregnancy and the earliest years are critical to the future health and well being of children and adults and that evidence based early interventions can have significant positive impacts does not always inform how services are commissioned.

Theneedforimprovementisnotnew; numerous reports have highlighted the issues. Individual initiatives have led to improve ments in specificareas, but have not resulted in the system wide changes required to improve outcomes. What is new is the opportunity to ensure the focus on outcomes in the new health and care system includes children and youn greople clearly and explicitly, from conception through to adult hood.
