



Report of the Strategic Director for Children and Young People

The function of Children's Centres in Derby

SUMMARY

1.1 There are 18 Children's Centres in Derby, all managed and run by the local authority (LA). Children's Centres have been developed in the city since 2004 and originally grew out of Sure Start Local Programmes, early excellence centres, neighbourhood nurseries (NNI) or from partnerships with local schools. There is no fixed delivery model that covers all 18 centres.

All meet the Children's Centre current core offer of:

- Integrated Early Years and Childcare
- Child and Family Health Services
- Family Support
- Adult Learning and access to Jobcentre Plus
- Outreach Services
- Families Information Service and access to childminders.

Integrated early years and education was a foundation for the development of the first phase of centres and of the 18 centres:

- three offer full day care 0-5 (part of the NNI initiative) subsidised by the LA
- three Children's Centres offering 0-5 integrated early years and childcare including registered full day care for 0-3s. These are small units which are costly to run as the ratio of staff to children is high
- two Children's Centres providing wrap-around care for three- and four-year-olds, which again is very costly to run as the number of staff required to cover the day is high
- six Children's Centres providing 0-5 care through partnership arrangements with the PVI sector at no cost to the LA
- four are not required to offer childcare as they are in the 70% more affluent areas
- 1.2 Strategic responsibility sits with the Early Years and Childcare service who manage the development, inspection and performance management of centres. Operational management sits with locality teams in most instances.
- 1.3 Each centre has an identified reach of children under five in their area and these figures were agreed with the DfE at time of designation. In total, centres reach target is over 14,000 under fives. Currently, centres are reaching on average 60% of these children and their families, with one centre reaching 100%.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 4.1 All Children's Centres in the city are fully designated to meet the current Children's Centre core offer detailed in the summary and are open five days a week within the hours of 8am until 6pm.
- 4.2 Activities across centres are varied dependent on the needs of the centres' communities, but there are standard activities which happen in all centres. This includes Peers Early Education Partnership (PEEP) which is delivered by centre staff and is part of the Early Years Outcomes' duty to support the increased attainment at Foundation Stage profile, stay and play activities and delivery of parenting programmes, family visiting and health clinics.
- 4.3 The core offer is supported by partner agencies including Health, Adult Learning and Jobcentre Plus who run a variety of activities and training courses. There is good partnership working with other agencies, particularly Health who deliver stay and weigh clinics and child development assessments in 17 of the 18 centres. Midwifery is delivered in eight of the centres and signposting to additional services takes place in all.

Alvaston Children's Centre was part of the 0-7 Partnership Programme, which focused on support for children's speech and language skills and whilst the partnership is no longer funded, Alvaston still remains the hub for speech and language support.

Family Visitors play a key role in delivering Children's Centre services and each centre has 2.5 FTE in the 30% Super Output Areas and 2 FTE in more affluent areas.

Part of their role is to visit or make contact with all new parents in the area to introduce and signpost to centre services. In addition, centres take referrals from Social Care, Health, schools and other agencies involved with families. Family visitors offer both support in families' own homes and or in accessing centre services. Often referrals come through vulnerable children's meetings, which are chaired by Social Care under-11 teams and this is often the most targeted approach to supporting those most vulnerable.

Each centre, through their own self-evaluation document and Ofsted's SEF, has identified who their most vulnerable groups are. In all centres this includes:

- teen parents
- children identified as in need or with a protection plan in place
- families where English may be a second language
- children or parents with disability
- fathers

Each centre has an identified teen parent champion who acts as an advocate and support for all teen parents in their area.

In addition, dependent on where a centre is located, there is specialist support in place for Traveller families, asylum seekers, Roma communities.

4.4 Each centre completes its own needs assessment and develops a delivery plan based on this and also in line with the recommended core offer.

All centres have access to Families Information Service and provide a base for local childminders to meet.

4.5 Centres each have their own advisory board, which should have an independent chair. This board supports user engagement and parents' forums and is the critical friend to the operational managers in Children's Centres. All evaluations of activities proposed developments are agreed by this board.

3.1 There are over 200 full and part time staff employed in children's centres.

5.1 All centres work within the constraints of LA policy and procedures and have an annual audit from the Health and Safety section.

6.1 In most cases children's centres are located in what's termed as pram pushing distance for families. New buildings all meet the relevant standards for climate change.

7.1 All children's centre activities are unit costed to ensure there is value for money.
