1. Number of approved foster carers: 159

2. Number of CLA not accessing education from the children's homes:

- 4 CLA are refusing to attend, of these 4, 2 have full time places and 2 have places in the pupil referral unit
- 2 CLA are permanently excluded
- 11 CLA are on a part time timetables
- 1 CLA is on remand
- 1 CLA is being refused admittance to school on health and safety grounds due to the child's complex needs
- 2 CLA asylum seeker young people- 1 starts school after half term and 1 is moving to a different Local Authority

Number of CLA not accessing education from foster care:

• 2 CLA are on part time timetables

3. Number of cautions and convictions (aged 10yrs plus):

19 out of 197 CLA, anticipated year end figure

4. Health of CLA (looked after for 12 months or more):

255 had a dental check and 226 an annual health assessment

5. Stability of placements of CLA- the definition is:

The percentage of children looked after at 31 March with three or more placements during the year

- The outturn figure at year end 31 March 2005 was 8.4%, with a target for 05/06 of 9%
- Derby 03/04 figure was 9.5%
- Comparator authority figure for 03/04 was 13%

6. Employment, education and training for care leavers- the definition is:

The ratio of the percentage of CLA on 1 April in their 17th year (aged 16) who were engaged in education, training or employment at the age of 19 to the percentage of young people in the population who were engaged in education training or employment at the age of 19

- The outturn figure for 31 march 2005 was 89.5%
- Derby 03/04 figure was 82.4%
- Comparator authority figure for 03/04 was 57%
