Austin primary care centre

It is planned to relocate Dr Horden's Practice from Village Street to the proposed site for new development, which is the Former Village Community School. The main entrance to the facility will be from Browning Street.

The full range of primary care services currently available at the Village Street surgery will be re-provided and a wider range of community services according to patient needs will be offered. The scheme will include:

- Physiotherapy treatments
- Dental services
- Near patient testing e.g. Blood tests, heart traces
- Minor treatment facilities
- Ophthalmology
- Meeting facilities for staff and patient groups

Design work and consultation work for this scheme has been completed and a full planning application has been submitted. Construction is expected to commence on site in summer 2005 in order for facilities to be in operation by late 2006.
