










# **Derby Homes**

88 additional job requests received from Derby Homes between January and March 2024




### Job requests between January - March 2024

661 job requests received between January and March this year


Councillor's accounted for the majority of job requests (22%)


Streetpride accounted for 17% of job requests

Cllr Requests Jan-March 2024


Categories included in the pie chart had 30+ requests between January and March 2024

#### Proactive Patrols between January and March 2024








Normanton and Chaddesden had the highest number of reported issues during proactive patrol

Parking accounted for 39% of issues identified on patrol (parking in restricted areas, double yellow lines, football parking)

Flytipping accounted for 33% of issues identified on proactive patrol

# **Locality Working**

Anti-social behaviour has been reported to the PPO team, PPO goes out to investigate

After chatting with one of the residents, they mention that they don't often have visitors and discuss several of their health concerns with the PPO

A Local Area Coordinator goes to visit the resident and they are glad the PPO asked them to check in. After two hours of talking, they arrange a follow up visit for further support












PPO talks to residents about anti-social behaviour within the block of flats The PPO discusses Local Area Coordination with the resident, stating they may be able to support with these issues. The resident is interested and consents to an introduction

# Case Study





# The process of issuing an FPN

Take pictures of fly tipping, put on PPE and look for evidence (any details or documentation alluding to who's fly tipped) In this instance, no FPN can be issued as no evidence was found (No identifiable information, no statements from public or CCTV available)

#### So what was the outcome?

- Evidence gathered and loggedSigns up to deter future fly tipping-Fly tipping removed
- Residents and local businesses encouraged to report issues

#### **Scenario:**

A Public Protection Officer has received a report of fly tipping in Sinfin. These items consist of a sofa, a fridge, and several bin bags of waste

What are the next steps?

Talk to residents nearby to see if there was any witnesses/talk to local businesses to see if any CCTV or statements are available

Where appropriate add signs to items that state the fly tipping has been reported

Find out if the Flytipping is on private or public land

Put up signs to discourage fly tipping and contact Street Pride and organise clearing of items
