Background

- Well established track record of delivering ESOL since the 1970s
- In the last 2 inspections in 2005 and 2007 the provision was graded as Good Grade 2
- In 2006/07 there were 895 individuals on ESOL courses and 1,328 enrolments. This represents 20% of all learners
- ESOL provision has a positive impact on social cohesion



Issues

- The provision is funded by the Learning and Skills Council and is subject to their funding rules and regulations
- There are restrictions on:
 - Non-EU citizens, who have not been resident in the EU for 3 years
 - Asylum seekers, unless they have settled status or have been waiting for a Home Office decision for more than 6 months
 - Spouses of all asylum seekers



ESOL Learners

- High levels of demand in 2006/07 there were 100 learners on the waiting list at Derby Multicultural Centre (DMC)
- Wide range of nationalities in June 2007 there were
 47 first languages represented at DMC
- Largest groups are from Pakistan, Poland and Iraq



New Regulations from Sept 2007

- The automatic right to fee remission was removed.
- Only those who are in receipt of means tested benefits are eligible for free classes.
- Course fees are set at £2.70 per hour for 2007/08
- As a result of a national Equalities Impact Assessment, DCC received £25,000 as a Hardship fund to be used to alleviate the impact on those who are most harshly affected - those on low incomes and spouses.
- The fund is not sufficient to meet every claim and will only be available for one year.



Impact


- Some learners have not returned to continue with courses
- The places available are being filled by those in receipt of benefits
- There is unmet demand in the Arboretum Ward but a reduction in demand at the Rycote centre in Darley ward.
- Staff are spending time giving benefits advice to encourage those who are eligible to apply
- The Hardship fund will be fully allocated by December 2007



Conclusion


- Demand for ESOL is expected to continue to be high
- Course fees may prevent some potential learners from joining courses or continuing on to higher level courses
- There is a new need for closer working between ALS and benefits advice services to ensure a greater take-up of benefits by eligible ESOL learners
- The minimum cost of continuing to support those classed as "hardship" cases will be at least £25,000 per annum


