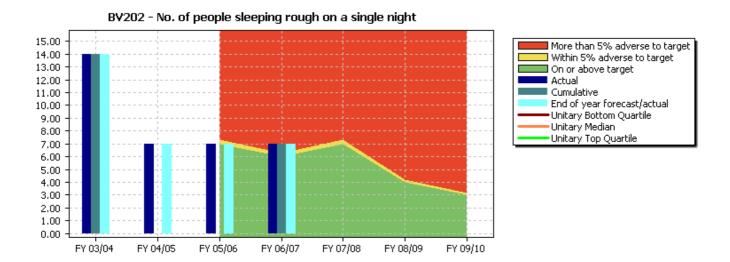

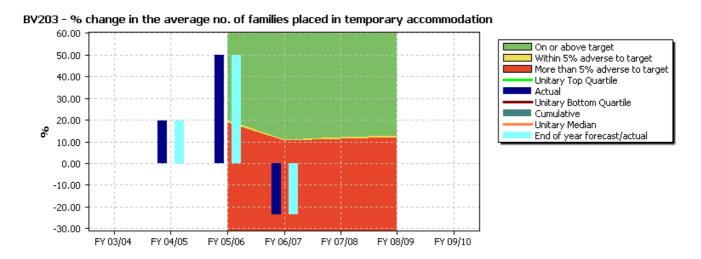

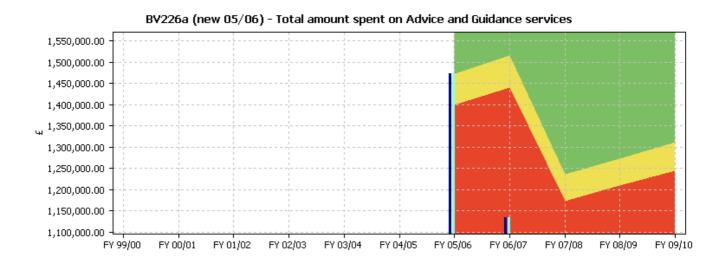
#### Commentaries

The increase in the numbers of families in temporary accommodation reflects the efforts made to reduce the use of bed and breakfast establishments except in emergencies. We have increased the numbers of houses and flats available for temporary accommodation in place of the routine use of B&B. The additional security of tenure which this provides has meant that the rate of case turnover is inevitably reduced and the length of time families are housed temporarily has increased. Overall this increases the numbers of people in temporary accommodation at any one time. Henry Cipcer - 10/05/2005

Emphasis on effective homelessness case management and prevention work has enabled the use of temporary accommodation to be reduced. DCLG have also placed emphasis on reducing the use of temporary accommodation and performance is likely to be improved further through 2007/08.

Data quality issues should have been greatly improved through the replacement of the Academy Housing Database with Abritas, which is far better suited to performance management functions. Henry Cipcer - 20/04/2007

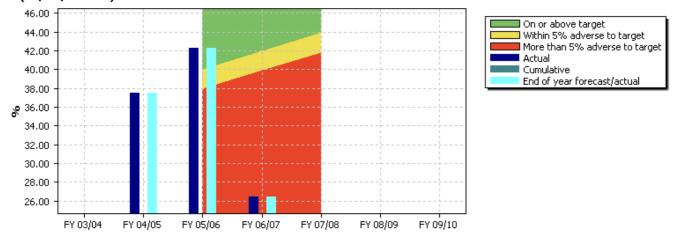
Update at Q3: Bid made with Social Services, for 38 Extra Care places to be made available by Housing 21, using their property in Alvaston. We expect a result on this bid by March 2007. If successful, Housing 21 will rebuild their chosen property and then run the development, with a target date for first lettings in August 2009.

We are also working with other providers, with a view to changing the use of some of their stock to Extra Care standard. Derby Homes are looking at Rebecca House at Uttoxeter Old Road, and Retail Trust are considering a property at Broadway, Alvaston. These are very much early stages, and no target dates are available as yet. Curtis T - 03/01/2007

#### Commentaries

Over the last three years, there has been a small but steady improvement in the percentage of people who feel they can influence decisions affecting their local area, from 36% in 2003 to 38% in 2004/5 and 42% in 2005/6.
