

Voluntary Sector Grant Aid Strategy 2011 – 2015

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Introduction

This document is based upon information contained in the 14th December 2010 Cabinet Report that introduced the Voluntary Sector Grant Aid Strategy 2011 - 2015 and the 12th April 2011 Cabinet Report that amended the strategy following consultation with the Voluntary and Community Sector (VCS), service users, partner agencies and the general public. One of the key recommendations approved by Council cabinet on 12th April was to revise the strategy to bring it in line with the final version of the Derby Plan and Council Plan, reflecting the six key outcomes of the Derby Plan.

Background

The Council is facing unprecedented challenge in its role as a place-shaper, commissioner and provider of public services. It is becoming the most efficient Council it can through the One Derby One Council transformation programme. However local government will have significantly less resources over the next four years as steps are taken by the government to improve the country's financial situation.

The Government has significantly reduced local authority grants over the next four year period. Derby City Council has an estimated savings target of £58m over the period and is required to save £27m during 2011/12. This will mean significant challenges for all service areas including grant funded services. The target savings from grant aided services over the period amount to £845k. Given this financial situation it will be even more imperative that all grant funded services provide excellent value for money, produce positive outcomes for people and support the City's and the Council's plans and objectives.

Grant aid is not the only way that the Council supports the VCS as funding is also provided through contracts with the sector. Opportunities for contracting with the sector are likely to increase as part of the changing role of the Council and the One Derby, One Council transformation programme. The Council also recognises the contribution the VCS makes, through consultation and participation in multi agency partnerships, to the joint planning and development of new services for the local community.

The Council acknowledges the significant contribution of the VCS in maintaining and improving the quality of life for the local community. The strategy builds on the positive partnerships that the Council has developed with many voluntary organisations, and the commitments made in the Compact between the Council and the VCS.

Strategic Objectives

This strategy seeks to provide a framework to maximise the value and benefit of voluntary sector support to the people of Derby through grant aid. As stated earlier, it is important to recognise that this is not the only way the Council will give funding to the sector. It will still remain an important partner in the provision of contracted services and those opportunities are likely to grow, as the Council takes a fundamental look at how services are provided.

Derby City Council wants to contribute to building a strong, cohesive society where families, networks, neighbourhoods and communities work together to build a strong community where people:

- Shape local services through active participation in the planning, design and delivery of services
- Problem solve on local issues
- Participate in local spending decisions such as the devolved Neighbourhood budgets
- Provide mutual aid and assistance to each other
- Increase civic participation

We believe the Voluntary, Community and Faith sector has a key role in helping us achieve these objectives.

The Strategy does:

- Focus Council grant aid funding on services that support the final version of the Derby Plan, the Council Plan and offer excellent value for money
- Maximise the benefit of Council grant funding for local residents
- Contribute toward creating a strong cohesive society where families, networks and neighbourhoods work together to build a stronger communities

Derby Plan, Council Plan and Grant Strategy Outcomes

The Grant Aid Strategy outcomes have been aligned with the final version of the Derby Plan and the Council Plan. Table 1 overleaf shows the link between each Grant Aid Strategy outcome and the two aforementioned plans.
