Report of the Corporate Director of Resources

Corporate Plan 2008-11 – Updated Action Plan

SUMMARY

- 1.1 The purpose of this report is to present Cabinet with a draft of the Corporate Plan Action Plan, which has been updated for 2009-10. The Corporate Plan Action Plan describes how the Council will deliver its vision and priorities.
- 1.2 In November 2008, Council agreed that the current priorities, as detailed in **Appendix 2**, would be retained for 2009-10. To support the delivery of these priorities the supporting action plan has been reviewed and updated.

- 2.1 To note the contents of the draft Corporate Plan Action Plan that contains information on how our priorities will be delivered.
- 2.2 To refer the updated Action Plan to Scrutiny Management Commission on 27 January 2009 for comment.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

Council Priorities 2008-11

- 3.1 The corporate priorities underpin our vision of 'Derby a city for all ages' and provide the framework for action planning and resource allocation across the Council. The Cabinet reviewed the 2008-11 priorities through a series of workshops in July 2008 and, following Cabinet approval on 30 September 2008, presented Council with a revised set of priorities for 2009-12 in November 2008 but these were rejected and it was agreed by Council that the current priorities, set out in **Appendix 2**, would be retained for 2009-10.
- 3.2 Each year, as part of the redrafting and consultation process the Council's priorities are presented to the Pointer Panel. Respondents are asked to rank local priority areas and say whether they agree with service growth or savings proposals and any increases in fees and charges to support the delivery of local priorities.

3.3 Whilst some of the priority areas are not directly comparable to last year's survey*, the top five priorities and bottom five priorities for 2008 compared to 2007 are as follows...

- 3.4 The outcomes from this consultation should be given due consideration when taking final decisions on budget proposals for 2009/10.
- 3.5 25% of the Pointer Panel respondents had heard or read about the Council's priorities prior to completing the survey, which is a 6% decline on last year. The drop in awareness on the Council's priorities will hopefully be addressed through more communication in the Council Tax Leaflet and the Council's magazine, 'Your Derby'.
- 3.6 When asked about increases in fees and charges 38% of respondents stated that they would be happy for an increase to support improvements in the areas that they ranked as most important, however when asked if they would be happy for an increase to avoid making efficiency savings in the least important areas only 29% said that they would be happy for this to occur. This information will be fed into the budget process.

Draft Action Plan 2009-10

- 3.7 As the current priorities are being retained for 2009-10, Chief Officers agreed that the current Corporate Plan and Posters would remain unchanged and work would focus on revising and updating the supporting action plan. The action plan is critical to the delivery of the Council's priorities as it sets out what work will be completed and how we will measure the progress that we are making against our priorities.
- 3.8 To improve the quality of the information contained within the action plan and to enhance the links with the Sustainable Community Strategy, officers have been asked to complete a new 'action definition form'. As a consequence of this change there are a number of provisional actions within the Plan that are awaiting further information. All provisional information has been highlighted in 'yellow'.

3.9 A working draft of the Action Plan is available electronically on CMIS - http://cmis.derby.gov.uk/CMISWebPublic/Binary.ashx?Document=12688 . The content of this document will be subject to further development and review by officers over the coming weeks in line with the budget process.

Next Steps

- 3.10 A workshop will take place on 21 January 2009, where Directors and Assistant Directors will review the draft Action Plan. The main aim of this session will be to identify more cross-cutting links and make sure that the contents of the Plan is outcome focused, clearly supporting the Sustainable Community Strategy.
- 3.11 The updated Action Plan will be circulated to Officers via Derbynet for further development throughout January 2009.
- 3.12 An updated copy of the Action Plan will be presented to Scrutiny Management Commission on 27 January 2009, for consideration.
- 3.13 Prior to submitting the final draft of the Action Plan to Council Cabinet on 17 February 2009, a copy will be placed on Derbynet for wider consideration.
- 3.14 The final version will be submitted to Council for approval on 2 March 2009 alongside the three-year budget.
