

NEIGHBOURHOODS OVERVIEW AND SCRUTINY BOARD 30 April 2013

Report of the Strategic Director of Resources

Neighbourhood Working

SUMMARY

- 1.1 Members received a report on the Neighbourhood Working proposals at the meeting of 25 September 2012. Cabinet had already agreed the proposals at their meeting of 15 August 2012, however, at this meeting Members made a recommendation to the Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods that the Neighbourhoods Scrutiny Board should receive regular updates with regards to development and implementation of the neighbourhood working proposals.
- 1.2 Following the approval of changes to structures made through the Revenue Budget Proposals 2013-2016 allowing for the Neighbourhood Working proposals to be implemented, the Board requested an update on the structure of Neighbourhood Working, the roles of Neighbourhood Officers, and how Neighbourhood Working will operate around the city.
- 1.3 The purpose of this report is to allow the Head of Communities and Partnerships to Board update the Board as requested.

RECOMMENDATION

2.1 To note and discuss the content of the update and to make appropriate comments or recommendations.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

3.1 To ensure that the Neighbourhoods Board is aware of the structure, role and operational detail of the newly implemented Neighbourhood Working.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

4.1 At the meeting of 25 September 201, the Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods and Streetpride presented his proposals for new neighbourhood working arrangements to the board. It was reported that the proposals had been considered by the Council Cabinet on 15 August 2012. The cabinet member outlined the new framework and explained that the proposals were intended to encourage active engagement within communities.

- 4.2 In response to queries from the board, the Director of Partnerships and Streetpride explained that existing employees would be transferred into the new structure. The director clarified that the neighbourhood workers would have powers of enforcement but training would be required prior to their use. He also envisaged that neighbourhood workers would educate communities regarding acceptable behaviour, identify persistent problems and offer effective solutions.
- 4.3 At this time, the board expressed concern that the redirection of resources to wards, which were perceived to have greater needs, would be at the expense of other wards, and questioned whether it was appropriate to categorise and compare the importance of different priorities across different neighbourhoods.
- 4.4 The Board highlighted a budget deficit and questioned whether the proposals represented best value for money. The cabinet member confirmed that work on the budget was still in progress. It was envisaged that the proposals would be implemented in January 2013.
- 4.5 The board resolved to recommend to the Cabinet Member for Neighbourhoods that:
 - arrangements are put in place to consult with Neighbourhood Boards and Ward Councillors prior to implementation on development of the proposals for input on an area-based level.
 - the Neighbourhoods Scrutiny Board receives regular updates with regards to development and implementation of the neighbourhood working proposals.
