# Joint Commissioning Strategy for Adults with Learning Disabilities

## RECOMMENDATION

1. That the members consider and note the attached joint commissioning strategy.

## SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 2.1 The attached strategy document was considered and approved by the Adult Services Cabinet Member on 10 January.
- 2.2 This is the first commissioning strategy for adults with learning disabilities in Derby and has been produced in partnership with the Derby Primary Care Trust (PCT).
- 2.3 The document shows that there are 890 people currently in receipt of learning disabilities services from the Council. The demand for this service is expected to grow over the next 6 years with the number of service users approximately 28% higher in 2012 than the current number.
- 2.4 The document identifies a number of areas for development to meet the future demands of the service. This includes amongst others to develop a range of provision as an alternative to large number of people using residential and large day centres and bringing back people from out of the area if they want this.
- 2.5 A detailed action plan will be developed following the approval by the Cabinet Member and the PCT Board approval.
- 2.6 Members are asked to consider and the note the strategy.
