Introduction...


This section of the Children and Young People's Plan has been produced in order to provide detailed explanation relating to the performance measures, targets and key actions underpinning the priorities incorporated into the 2008-2011 Plan.

The Children Act 2004 and the change programme 'Every Child Matters' is explicit in the need for Local Authority services and their Children's Trust partners to focus on improving results across the Five Outcomes for children and young people. The five outcomes are:

- Be Healthy
- Stay Safe
- Enjoy and Achieve
- Making a Positive Contribution
- Achieve Economic Well-being.

The overarching strategic priorities of this plan focus on;

- Parenting
- Safety, belonging and being valued in the community
- Building ambition, aspiration and achievement
- Physical, emotional well being and safe choices.




The Importance of Improving Results and Accountability

Effective performance management requires defined roles and responsibilities and clear ownership of outcome measures. Managing performance is defined by the Audit Commission and IDeA (2004) as:

'taking action in response to actual performance to make outcomes for users and the public better than they would otherwise be'.

Historically performance frameworks have focussed on how much we are doing, rather than how well we are doing it and whether it is making a difference. Achieving better results and accountability for children and young people reflects the 'plan-do-review-revise' elements of the performance cycle and supports linking, priorities and resources throughout the framework - the so-called 'golden thread'.

The diagram below explains the golden thread of the CYP Plan



Performance Management Framework

Effective performance management and accountability requires a positive culture and professional practice to ensure that we are focusing on three clear questions:

- What are we doing?
- How well are we doing it?
- What difference is it making?

Understanding our role, responsibility and ownership of performance management supports this process. The CYPP Performance Management Framework was developed to aid this understanding by outlining clear key principles and themes;

Key Principles

- Outcome driven any process consists of three elements- inputs, outputs and outcomes. It is essential to measure all three, but it is the outcome that is important
- Evidence based information produced is based on good data quality, it is complete, valid, accurate, reliable, timely and relevant
- Transparent information must be objective and readily accessible
- Focused we are clear on our priorities and are not monitoring for monitoring sake
- Owned all partners have a role in managing performance

Key Themes

- Strong leadership A performance culture is inspired by strong leadership at all levels
- Clear accountabilities Roles and responsibilities are defined with clear ownership of outcome measures
- Regular and robust performance information data quality is robust with integrated and timely reporting on Performance Eye
- Active management of performance Improved challenge of performance
- Support and learning Learning is shared across the Partnership

The CYPP outcomes are currently monitored using a database owned by Derby City Council, called 'Performance Eye', with identified accountable and compiling officers for each performance indicator. Proactive and honest assessment of performance at all levels is a critical part of any performance culture. This can take the form of rigorous target setting or effective action planning to focus on areas of underperformance, ensuring prompt corrective action to bring performance back in line with planned profiles. Performance Eye underpins the performance framework, enabling different access levels according to individual roles and responsibilities.

The framework outlines the process for the reporting of performance data, ultimately feeding into the Joint Strategic Commissioning Board which will challenge and action where appropriate and necessary. This is important to the success of embedding a performance management culture into the partnership. If well managed, the framework should give confidence to children and young people, parents, carers and providers of services that the partnership is managing its priorities for children and young people. It will also secure improvements in performance, give equal weighting to local and national outcomes and provide support and intervention where needed.

Key Actions, Targets and Performance Measures

The overarching strategic priorities inform each of the five outcome areas for 2008-11. Target setting is based on accurate profiling and forecasting of data to secure service improvement.

The Change for Children: **Every Child Matters** Outcomes Framework clusters Performance Indicators within the Five Outcomes. The key actions of each outcome area and the performance targets and measures for 2008 to 2009 are featured in the following grids.
