Requests to work beyond age 65

RECOMMENDATION

1. To note the report.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 2.1 At the meeting of the Personnel Committee on 1 April 2009, members approved revisions to the Council's Retirement Policy.
- 2.2 During the discussion, members requested details of how many requests to work beyond age 65 have been received, how many have been approved and how many have been declined.
- 2.3 The table below sets out the details for the first two complete financial years since the introduction of the Age Regulations in October 2006.

For comparison, the number of employees who became age 65 in 2007-08 was 61 and in 2008-09 was 57.

2.4 These figures are something of a mixed blessing for the Council. On the one hand, it is encouraging that older members of our workforce want to continue working for us, an opportunity which was intended by the regulations. On the other hand, at times of budget difficulty, a reduction in the number of age retirements reduces the amount of natural wastage normally relied on to avoid redundancies.

2.5 For information, the Government published a strategy document on 13 July 2009 called "Building a Society for all Ages" in which they have announced that the review of the default age of 65 years for retirement will be brought forward by one year to 2010.
