Report of Assistant Director - Community Policy

Area Panel Budget Proposals 2004/5

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 1.1 The Area Panel 3 budget allocation for 2004/5 is £22,000. The Panel also has an additional budget of £5,778 carried forward from 2003/4, which means that a total budget of £27,778 is available for allocation to projects during this financial year. A list of projects funded so far in 2004/5 is attached to this report in Appendix 3.
- 1.2 The area panel is asked to consider whether to support five applications for funding received from:

- 1.3 A short summary of each project is attached to this report in Appendix 2.
- 1.4 The Area Panel Grant Appraisal Panel met on 7 December to appraise each application against the new criteria agreed by Council on 21 April 2004. The purpose of the appraisal panel is to consider and appraise each application to support the area panel to make decisions to approve or reject applications. The Appraisal Panel has made a series of recommendations for each application and they are stated in the table in paragraph 1.5. More details about the recommendations are included in Appendix 2. The recommendations are based on the information provided by the applicants measured against the area panel funding criteria.

- 1.6 The Council Constitution states that the Area Panels can 'use a delegated budget for local environmental and community purposes'. Therefore, if an application does not specifically refer to a local activity, consideration needs to be given to the appropriateness of allocating area panel funding to the project. In deciding whether to support each application, the area panel will assess the funding request against the funding criteria and its priorities.
- 1.7 The new funding criteria mean that applications need to provide a service in response to the needs of local residents and meet at least one of the following criteria:
 - improve access for local people to existing services
 - provide a service in response to an issue raised in a community update report
 - contribute to improvements which will provide a benefit to local residents
 - assist in providing an integrated service in response to an issue raised at an area panel meeting
 - enable residents to participate in their community or at area panel meetings

Applications also need to:

- provide evidence of need for the application
- show evidence that ongoing maintenance or revenue costs have been approved by the relevant Council department, if necessary.
- 1.8 The priorities for supporting an application are that it:
 - is from a voluntary or community group
 - shows evidence of match funding or self help
 - provides a service in response to the needs of local residents
 - will directly benefit people living in the geographical area covered by the area panel
 - show evidence of how the project will be sustained beyond the period of funding, if it is not a one-off project
 - contributes to the delivery of one or more of the Council's corporate objectives.

- 1.9 In most circumstances, the amount of funding that the area panel will award to an applicant will be between £50 and £2,000. However, the area panel does have the discretion to award more if it considers the application to be a priority for the area.
- 1.10 If these five proposals are approved, the implications for the total budget for Area Panel 3 in 2004/5 will be:

IMPLICATIONS

Financial

1.1 Area panels must consider priorities within the area when considering requests for funding. Not all requests that meet the criteria will be considered a priority. When supporting or rejecting an application over £1,000, Area Panel 1 must give reasons for its decision.

Legal

- 2.1 Area Panel 3 has delegated authority to use its budget for local environmental and community purposes.
- 2.2 Section 19 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 empowers the Council to offer grants to voluntary and other organisations to provide any recreational facilities.
- 2.3 Any decision involving the making of a grant or loan over £1,000 to any voluntary body is deemed to have a significant impact on two or more wards and is therefore a key decision.
- 2.4 After a key decision has been taken, the Director of Corporate Services must publish a record of every executive decision taken at that meeting within two days of that meeting. The record must include a statement of the reasons for each decision and any alternative options considered or rejected at the meeting. No action will be taken on any such decision for five clear days from the date of publication.

Corporate objectives and priorities

5.1 The provision of grants to community projects can contribute to the delivery of the Council's key objectives and priorities. The summary of each project in Appendix 2 includes an indication of how each one contributes.

Applicant 1: Bishop Lonsdale CE (Aided) Primary and Nursery School

Project: Course for parents/ carers/ on Strengthening Families and Community Parent Programme

Total cost of project: £500 Amount of funding requested: £200

Wards: Abbey

Description

The Village Learning Store has agreed to run a parenting skills course at Bishop Lonsdale Primary and Nursery school. The school can provide the accommodation and beverages free of charge, but they will need to provide a crèche for parents with young children. They estimate that this will cost £50 per session – based on 2 1/2 hours for 2 crèche workers.

It is recognised that children learn and succeed better when school and home provide common messages. Many of their parents have asked for helping in guiding and managing their children and this course will aim to empower them. The school is constantly seeking to involve and strengthen the local community. If the course helps a few of our families, then the effect is long lasting in terms of working with younger siblings, strengthening the position of parents and promoting good home-school links.

The project will begin with the provision of 3 fun outreach sessions on 22, 23, and 24 Feb 2005 in the play ground to engage parents in the project and build their interest in attending the parenting sessions. The Learning Store will also produce some leaflets for distribution to promote the course. This will be followed by the free course, which will be open to any parents but will target the parents of children with particular behavioural problems. The sessions will be held on:

 11 March 2005
 18 March 2005
 2-2/1/2 hour sessions
 2-2/1/2 hour sessions
 2-2/1/2 hour sessions

Possibly another session if needed March 2005

The Learning store will be running the outreach session and the course free of charge and provide flyers to promote the event. The school will be contributing through the free-use of their premises and the provision of refreshments.

The school have however requested a contribution of £200 from the panel to fund the provision of two workers to run a crèche for 4 sessions.

Applicant 2: Duke of Edinburgh Award Group based at Bemrose Community School

Project: Equipment for Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme

Total cost of project: £3,100 Amount of funding requested: £2,000

Wards: Arboretum, Abbey and Normanton

Description:

The Duke of Edinburgh's Award aims to provide young people with an enjoyable, challenging and rewarding programme of personal development, which is of the highest quality and the widest reach.

The project will enable pupils from Bemrose to gain experiences in activities that have previously been denied to them. They participate in team building activities, camp craft, physical expedition training as well as personal developments and training.

Unfortunately, due to the social background of many of our pupils, many lose out on these experiences due to a lack of funding for items that are essential to the expedition element of the Award. Without access to this specialised equipment many of the pupils would not be able to take part in the Award. They aim to use the funding to purchase the essential equipment needed for the pupils to carry out the expedition training and final assessment and thus complete the Duke of Edinburgh Bronze Award.

A high proportion of the children involved with the scheme come form the Arboretum and Normanton area. Compared to previous years we have a higher percentage of Asian boys and girls taking part on the Award.

The Award group is based at school but staff supporting the group and assisting in its running do so on a voluntary basis. The equipment that we request would also be available for use by Youth Services, other D of E Award groups as well as Scout groups.

Match funding:

- £600 pupil enrolment funds to be used for ongoing costs throughout the Award such as campsite costs, food, travel, insurance, assessor fees
- Voluntary support from staff members at Bemrose Community school
- £500 Bemrose Community School funding for staff training for one member of staff to do Walking Group Leaders Award WGL to become professionally qualified to assess the young people

The application has come from a relatively new teacher at Bemrose school. He has started a Duke of Edinburgh group, which had previously not been available to the pupils at the school. Bemrose students now have the opportunities to engage in expeditions and to develop a connection and appreciation for the countryside.

Applicant 3: Hindu Culture and Welfare Society of Derby

Project: Friday Luncheon Club

Total cost of project: £2,500 Amount of funding requested: £2,500

Wards: Normanton and Arboretum

Description

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This group is looking for funding to provide a luncheon club for Hindu Asian elderly people, to be based at the Hindu Cultural and Welfare Society of Derby, Peartree, Derby. They have identified a need for a luncheon club on Fridays for Asian elderly people. They currently provide Asian snacks at the club, which they say is regularly used by 40 - 50 people.

Presently there is a kitchen at the site, with worktops, a cooker, a sink, a fridge, a microwave. They have requested funding to purchase some additional equipment to enable them to set up the luncheon club and provide a hot, nutritious meal for Asian vegetarians.

The proposed Club will be run by volunteers from the Hindu Culture and Welfare Society of Derby. It will be self-sustaining as a small charge per meal will be made. The lunch club may, in future, be associated with welfare advice/health advice time, either prior to or after the meal.

The group have been asked to provide evidence of need for an additional luncheon Club. This is particularly important given that the Council has already funded the purchase of equipment for a luncheon club at the Geeta Bhaven Hindu Temple.

Applicant 4: Indus Project

Project: How to drug proof your kids

Total cost of project: £1,494 Amount of funding requested: £1,096

Wards: Normanton and Arboretum

Description:

"How to Drug Proof your kids" is an education, prevention and intervention programme motivated by the increasing drug problem among young people and the frustrated attempts by parents to steer their children away from the harmful use of drugs. Through this programme parents will:

- Develop home-based strategies to help their children make informed choices about drug use:
- Be better informed of current drug use in the community and its related harm;
- Spend time examining their own beliefs, attitude and behaviour about drug use;
- Gain valuable community information and access local support.

The project will be publicised in mid May 2005 and promoted initially through an awareness evening at end of May 2005. The first course will be completed in July 2005 and the next course will end in February 2006. 20 -24 parents will benefit from each course, which is planned to be run twice a year. However, it is anticipated that the effects of the course will benefit each and every family involved and the wider community as children and young people choose to say "no" to drugs. Therefore, the estimated number to benefit can be given as approximately 100 per year.

Since the appraisal panel met, this application has been discussed with the Drug and Alcohol Action Team. They are already working with this group and have indicated that they are happy for the panel to support the group. They have already asked the group should join the DAAT Young Persons Task Group and to them to carry out an evaluation of their project. Therefore, if the panel agree to fund this project it is suggested that it is given subject to compliance with these conditions.

Applicant 5: One Voice Ek Awaaz

Project: One Voice Ek Awaaz New Initiative

Total cost of project: £2000 Amount of funding requested: £2,000

Wards: Normanton and Arboretum

Description:

Ek Awaaz will provide the following activities:

- 1. Information, advice and guidance in different languages and different formats
- 2. Consultation:
 - a. Needs assessment through existing work with the local community and by listening to people's views in face-to-face situations.
 - b. Outreach work such as home visits and road shows.
- 3. Provide a transport service for people who find it difficult to get to the office and are on low incomes, events and activities (this will be run by volunteers)
- 4. Inform people about different ways in which they can get involved and participate in local partnerships and management committee meetings and influence services provided by the area.
- 5. Assist existing groups and the development of new groups
- 6. Raise awareness with the community
- 7. We will advertise all of our services widely and will publish regular newsletters, which we will distribute to all of our members and to organisations to raise awareness.
- 8. Create opportunities for health professionals and other organisations to offer their services and enable people easy access towards these services.
- 9. Support professional services to access grant
- 10. Training, education and employment opportunities for service users and for volunteers.

This project will engage the community to become involved and to influence the services that are provided. It will empower people to gain confidence. The group have asked for a sum of £2,000 which is broken down as follows:

• Publicity £800

Running costs – lighting, heating, refreshments for volunteers and stationary £1,200

The group have been asked to supply a copy of their business plan and this more information will be added to this summary before the report is finalised.
