#### Introduction

We are consulting widely on the Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment for Derby city. To share your views, please fill in this questionnaire and return it using our freepost address – no stamp needed. Your views should reach us by **Monday 6 December**.

## **Background**

In 2008 a White Paper called 'Pharmacy in England: Building on strengths - delivering the future' was published by the Department of Health. It set out practical ways that pharmacists could help improve patient care by delivering personalised pharmaceutical services. When the Health Act became law in November 2009, it said that all primary care trusts must develop and publish a Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA). The assessment will help primary care trusts decide what pharmacy services are needed for local people.

NHS Derby City is responsible for making sure that people living in Derby city have access to high quality pharmacy services. These services include the supply of drugs, medicines and appliances that are prescribed by the NHS, for example by your GP. Local pharmacies may also provide a range of other services including health information/ advice, tests and treatment for minor ailments.

## **Profile of Derby City**

Derby has a population of around 239,000 and is made up of seventeen areas called wards. Around 290,000 people are registered with a GP practice in the city because 17% of people who are registered live in the surrounding area. This is probably because two of NHS Derby City's main GP surgeries are located over the border in Southern Derbyshire and Erewash, and other GP practices have branch surgeries in the county.

Derby is an ethnically diverse city with a particularly large Asian population. It has a greater percentage of Indian and Pakistani people, as well as Black Caribbean people, compared to the ethnic makeup of England. The largest concentration of Derby's Asian population can be found in the Arboretum and Normanton Wards.

#### **Developing the Assessment**

The Pharmaceutical Needs Assessment (PNA) looks at whether pharmacies in Derby meet the needs of the local population. It considers the location of pharmacies, opening times /access and the quality /range of services provided. To help develop our PNA, NHS Derby City asked local people to tell us how they felt about the location of pharmacies in the city and the types of services they offered. We also looked at other evidence such as:

- calls to our Patient Advice and Liaison Service (PALS)
- comments about pharmacies in our Primary Care Consultation and
- results of community pharmacy satisfaction surveys.

#### **Number of Pharmaceutical Services**

Question 1

Derby has a higher than average number of pharmacies per 10,000 people. There are currently 65 pharmacies spread around the city with the largest number located in the centre. This means that someone living in the city centre can reach a pharmacy within a twenty minute walk. Anyone living in other areas of Derby can access a pharmacy by public transport or walking within 20 minutes. All pharmacies have varied opening times with provision from 7am to midnight Monday to Friday, 7am to 11pm on Saturday and 8am to 9pm on Sunday.

#### **Types of Pharmaceutical Services**

Pharmacies in Derby offer a range of services for managing and preventing illness as well as promoting healthier lifestyles. All pharmacies offer essential services including dispensing of medication, signposting to appropriate services and repeat dispensing which are funded nationally. Many deliver advanced services such as medication use reviews (MURS) for which they are accredited. NHS Derby City also commission pharmacies to provide enhanced services, such as:

- needle supply programme
- supervising and administering methadone
- support and advice for people who want to guit smoking
- provision and advice to people requiring emergency contraception.

Although the pharmacies across the city currently provide many of these services there remains scope for change in the level and range of services provided. **Question 5** How do you feel about the range of services provided at the pharmacy you use most often?
