#### **YOUTH SERVICE PLAN 2004 – 2005**

#### SECTION 1 FUNCTION AND SCOPE OF THE SERVICE

1.1 The aim of the Youth Service is to contribute to the personal development of young people aged 12 – 25 years, within the context of a multi-racial society.

## 1.2 In working towards this aim, youth workers have three key priorities:

- Supporting young people's social and educational development
- Giving young people an influential voice
- Ensuring young people participate positively in society as active citizens

## 1.3 Youth Service Key Objectives

In March 2000 the Youth Service re-defined its objectives to give greater clarity of purpose to its functions as a modern Youth Service. The following key objectives reflect major national and local strategies targeted at young people:

- Promoting Social Inclusion;
- · Raising and Recognising Achievement;
- Promoting Citizenship;
- Widening Young People's Experiences and Promoting Lifelong Learning;
- Providing a Voice for Young People;
- Promoting Healthy Living;
- Reducing Youth Crime and Anti Social Behaviour.

# 1.4 Transforming Youth Work – Resourcing Excellent Youth Services

In March 2001 the Government published its Consultation Document entitled 'Transforming Youth Work'. The document underlined the important strategic location of the Youth Service within the Local Authority. It outlined specific parameters and functions for the Youth Service nationally.

#### These include:

- Targeting 80% of Youth Service resources at the 13 19 age range;
- Underlining the Youth Service's central role within the new Connexions Service:
- Maximising the Youth Service's unique role to contribute to the Social Inclusion Agenda;
- Utilise the Youth Service to ensure young people have an effective and influential voice.

The Government's Transforming Youth Work Agenda continued to gather pace through 2002, culminating in the publication, in December 2002, of its 'landmark'. document 'Resourcing Excellent Youth Services'. The document describes the following Government expectations of the Local Authority.

The Local Authority has a duty to ensure the provision of a sufficient Youth Service. The Local Authority should:

- Provide strategic leadership for the whole Youth Service;
- Ensure the local authority Youth Service is a key contributing partner to the Connexions Service, and local preventative strategies;
- Ensure the active participation of young people in the specification, governance, management, delivery and quality assurance of youth services;
- Secure appropriate and coherent youth work provision through coherent partnership arrangements;
- Take a leading role in representing Youth Service interests at local, regional, national and European government levels;
- Provide high quality youth work in settings where the local authority is uniquely placed to make direct provision, and
- Ensure safe environments supervised by skilled and caring workers, providing a facility in which the community has the utmost confidence.

## 1.5 Youth Services Corporate Function

The Youth Service's corporate function is set within the City Council's Vision for the city, and contributes to the following corporate objectives and values.

Through the services we provide and in partnership with others, we will make Derby a city of:

- Strong and positive neighbourhoods with good local services where people feel safe and there are strong relationships within and between communities;
- Education where provision responds to peoples' needs, so they can develop skills and knowledge all through their lives, leading to better life choices and chances;
- Protecting and supporting people through social, education, housing and health care services working together for vulnerable adults and children, reduce health inequalities, and help people live independent lives in the way they choose.

The Council will:

- Be open, transparent and honest;
- Value its employees in delivering services;
- Develop effective partnerships with all stakeholders, especially Derby's residents.

The Service will also work towards the following corporate priorities to assist the Council achieve its vision for Derby.

- (2) Tackle under-achievement in schools, in particular by helping schools come out of special measures or serious weaknesses and preventing other schools entering these categories;
- (8) Enhance the community leadership role of the Council both at strategic and neighbourhood level, through partnership working and listening to, and communicating with the public.

# 1.6 Derbyshire Connexions Partnership (DCXP)

The Youth Service is a key partner within the Derbyshire Connexions Partnership and contributes to the following DCXP targets:

- The proportion of 16 19 year olds not in employment, education or training (NEET);
- Attendance rates in compulsory education;
- The proportion of 13 19 year olds taking part in personal development opportunities;
- The proportion of 13 19 year olds who have been helped by a Connexions interaction.

## **Service Structure**

The Youth Service is managed by the Head of Youth Services, responsible to the Assistant Director of Education, Lifelong Learning and Community.

There is a Senior Management Team comprising of a Deputy Head of Service and 6 Youth Team Leaders.

There are 31 full-time youth work staff and over 100 part-time staff who make up the six service delivery teams covering the city. (Appendix 1 details the Organisational Chart).

## **Partnership Arrangements with Connexions**

Following agreement between the Derbyshire Connexions Service and the Derby Connexions Partnership in February 2004, the delivery arrangements for connexions provision in Derbyshire have changed from a sub contracting model to that of a direct delivery model, under a new company called Connexions Derbyshire.

These arrangements have not altered the Youth Services' preferred supplier contract for the effective involvement of young people in the Connexions Service.

The Derby Local Connexions Partnership (LCP) remains in place, having had a very successful; year. The LCP has worked well under the astute guidance of the Director of Education, and good healthy dialogue has taken place between a wide range of partners on issues. The Joint Planning Group, made up of representatives of Connexions and the City and County's Education Services and Youth Services have rationalised their meeting arrangements. A good indication of the excellent work being undertaken between the Services at grassroots.

At a local level the joint operational meeting arrangements between Connexions and Youth Service have become well established, with increasing examples of good joint delivery models, including the Noel Baker/Southgate pre E to E interaction and work undertaken in Spondon and Mackworth between Connexions PA's and the Service's Neighbourhood Youth Worker.

The Youth Service's contribution to Connexions includes:

- Secondment of 1.5 youth work staff operating as Connexions Personal Advisers;
- All full-time youth workers will complete the Introduction to Connexions Training;
- Personal and social development opportunities in evening youth provision;
- Detached youth work with disaffected young people in eight areas of the city;
- The SPACE information, advice and counselling service;
- All main youth centres establishing Connexions Information Points;
- Connect 2 Life-skills project delivered as part of Learning Gateway/E2E
- Specialist projects supporting young people at risk e.g. runaways
- Provision of youth centres as a contact point and meeting venues for PA's
- Extensive summer activity programme;
- Delivering elements of the Connexions U Project programme
- Specific projects for young people e.g. ethnic minority groups, young people with disabilities;
- Support for the city-wide youth forum;
- Delivery of specialist work in agreement with key partners e.g. teenage pregnancy strategy, drugs and alcohol action team plans;
- Community cohesion activity programme in partnership with voluntary organisations and community groups.

## **Community Cohesion**

The Youth Service has played a variety of key roles in promoting Community Cohesion throughout the City, including:

- Co-ordination of Summer Holiday Activity Programmes;
- Organising an annual Let's Kick Racism Out of Football Event;

- Encouraging young people's involvement in Community Carnivals etc;
- Mediating and advocating on behalf of young people;
- Supporting schools and Derby College to meet the needs of Asian and African Caribbean pupils/students.

The partnership with the Youth Offending Service through, in particular, the Positive Activities for Young People programme, and its Anti Social Behaviour Team has become increasingly well developed. The recently established Neighbourhood Youth Worker posts in Spondon, Mickleover and Keldholme Lane have enhanced this partnership development.

The Service has also played an important role in the Home Office funded Inner City Community Cohesion Project, which is managed by YOS. The project has been very successful in appointing young people as community facilitators.

The City Council see the Youth Service as a key player in bringing young people together to develop mutual understanding and opportunities for positive activity and participation.

## **East Midlands Regional Youth Work Unit**

Derby City, through its Head of Youth Services, have contributed significantly to the establishment of the East Midlands Regional Youth Work Unit. Established in April last year the unit is already encouraging active sharing of good practice between other East Midlands Services. Derby is making an excellent contribution to the work of the unit, particularly in relation to the National Youth Agency funded Curriculum Project, which should result in an East Midlands Curriculum Framework for Evening Youth Provision.

GOEM have fully supported the establishment of the youth work unit, and have provided excellent support to the Youth Service in terms of the New Ofsted Self Assessment Framework.

A Young People's Co-ordinator Post is shortly to be established at the EMRYWU, and this will offer additional support to the city's Youth Forum.

## **Links with the Voluntary Youth Work Sector**

The voluntary Youth Work sector plays a crucially important role in providing a wide range of specialist support and social education activities for young people in the city.

Uniformed, faith and independent voluntary organisations have a variety of well established links with the Youth Service and other Council Departments.

Much success has been achieved this year primarily through the recently established Voluntary Co-ordinator Post, jointly funded by the City Council and Connexions, to improve the sectors ability to participate in the work of the Connexions Service and Youth Service. The post is strategically located in and managed by Derby CVS.

The key success has been the establishment of an effective and well represented Voluntary Youth Sector Forum which has enabled Connexions and the Youth Service to liaise effectively through a well established network.

The Youth Service provides the following support to voluntary youth organisations:

- Free use of premises;
- Employment and secondment of youth workers;
- Support from the voluntary section liaison officer;
- Grant Aid to projects;
- · Access to resources including minibuses;
- Programme development;
- Access to training courses including the Part-time Diploma in Youth Work

In 2002-03 the total cost of this support was £70,384.

## **Involvement of Staff and Young People**

One of the key objectives for the Service is 'Providing a Voice for Young People'. Young people have the right to be consulted and play an active part in decision making. Young people's active involvement in the delivery and development of Youth Service provision is central to the success of the Youth Service.

The vast majority of innovative developments in the Service over the last 6 years can be directly attributed to the central involvement of fieldwork staff and young people.

The Service has a high quality and committed staff team, who have been encouraged by senior management and elected members to be innovative, take risks and support young people on the margins. Much of this work has involved consulting, mediating and advocating on behalf of young people.

For example, the SPACE Youth Information Centre was established following detailed consultations with young people on crucial issues such as:

- Range of services to be provided;
- Location of the project;
- Opening hours;
- Layout and decoration of the premises;
- · Recruitment of staff.

Our detached youth work teams have been involved in a range of young people consultations in local communities on issues such as Youth Shelters, new young people's park facilities etc.

Detached teams continue to work with and on behalf of young people to build bridges between young people and their community during periods of conflict. This is usually done in partnership with elected members, the Police, Anti Social Behaviour Teams, Derby Homes and local residents.

The Chaddesden Park Project was an excellent example of a very negative anti social behaviour problems being turned into a very positive development, because service providers listened to what young people wanted and young people changed their behaviour pattern.

More recent examples of similar effective work being undertaken involves the Spondon, Mickleover and Littleover detached teams.

The Youth Service plays a key role in the development and support of the Derby Youth Forum. Over the past year young people on the Forum have been involved in consultations on transport, identity cards, the re-development of the Riverside and the proposed new Mobile Youth Project.

The Youth Forum was also invited to an open question time event in the Council Chamber, and 6 members took part in a Council Cabinet meeting.

Derby's United Kingdom Youth Parliament representatives also meet regularly with the Cabinet Member for Youth and Community. She in turn attends Youth Forum meetings on a regular basis.

In 2001 the Youth Forum undertook an extensive survey of young people's needs. The survey focused particularly on hard to reach young people. The results showed that young people were concerned about a lack of leisure facilities, inadequate public transport and crime and safety issues.

The EDGE Yong people's Prostitution Project, Derby Runaways Project and the OASIS Young Tenants Floating Support Project are three excellent examples of how Youth Service personnel have championed the cause of at risk groups, brought organisations together and consulted with young people to develop innovative partnership projects, managed by the Youth Service.

The Youth Service plays a lead preferred supplier role in the involvement of young people in the delivery of Services within the remit of the Derbyshire Connexions Partnership. Excellent work has been undertaken in the last twelve months through 'Voices in Action', a thoroughly representative group of young people who have been actively involved in the work of Derby's Local Connexions Partnership. 'Voices in Action' has been involved in issues relating to homelessness, teenage pregnancy, mental health services and the development of the Youth Awards Kite Mark Scheme.

In 2002 consultations took place with young people of Pakistani origin, a key under-achieving group. This resulted in a post being established to meet a variety of needs.

A very successful Afro Caribbean Youth Conference was organised in partnership with the West Indian Community Centre, entitled 'Realising Your Dreams'. This has resulted in a young people's group being established to move forward the issues raised at the conference.

Youth clubs have an established system of involving young people in the planning, monitoring and evaluation of their club programmes. This termly planning process is a key part of the Service's Quality Assurance System.

The Service also consults on a regular basis with a large cross section of its users to judge customer satisfaction.

The most recent survey highlighted the following opinions of the Service by its users:

The 3 best things about their projects were:

- · Meeting friends;
- Playing games;
- Taking part in sport.

## The 3 worst things were:

- The club did not open enough;
- Misbehaviour by other members;
- The club needs better equipment.

Users were very positive in their attitudes towards staff, particularly with regard to their ability and commitment to listen and encourage young people, an din generating a sense of belonging.

As part of the recent best Value Review, a group of non-users were consulted through a Focus Group exercise. 16 young people aged 13 – 20 were consulted on three key issues:

- The image of the Youth Service;
- Why they didn't use the Youth Service;
- What would attract them to use the Youth Service.

The key conclusions to be drawn from the consultations included:

- The Service needs to market itself better;
- Premises need to be modernised with a wider range of activities and equipment;
- Young people want youth clubs in their neighbourhood, and open more often;
- Young people need to be reassured that youth clubs are safe places to attend.

## **SECTION 2 PERFORMANCE INDICATORS**

In December 2003 the Government identified the following indicators to enable Youth Services to measure their own performance:

- The level of 'reach' into the resident 13 19 population against a bench mark of 25%;
- The level of participation of the 13 19 population in youth work (against a bench mark of 15%):
- The proportion of participants in youth work who gain recorded outcomes (against a bench mark of 60%);
- The proportion of participants in youth work who gain accredited outcomes (against a bench mark of 30%).

The Service in Derby is charged with the task of setting targets against these new performance measures in 2004/05.

The most recent NYA Audit figures indicated that the Derby Youth Service works with above average numbers of young people, based upon its 1.17% allocation of the Education Budget.

A recent independent evaluation of the Service substantiated these figures by indicating that Derby was a modern Service giving good value for money.

# Best Value Performance Indicators, per head of 13 – 19 population

The net Youth Service expenditure is identified as the Government's Best Value Indicator 33. Figures for the years 2000/01 to 2003/04 indicate that Derby has exceeded its target for each of the financial years within this period. The target for 2004/05 is £96.89.

## **Other Key Targets**

The Youth Service, in partnership with key agencies and services primarily works towards the following key targets.

## **Connexions Partnership targets:**

 10% reduction in the proportion of 16 – 19 year olds not in education, employment or training (NEET).

## LEA Education Development Plan Targets (2003 and 2004) for:

- % of 16 year olds obtaining 5 or more GCSE's at A\* C (or equivalent);
- % of 16 year olds obtaining 5 or more GCSE's including English and Maths at Grade G or above (or equivalent);
- % of half days missed at maintained secondary schools.

## **Local LSC Targets**

- Increase in the number of 19 year olds achieving a qualification equivalent to NVQ Level 2 between 2000 and 2004;
- Increase in the number of 16 18 year olds in structured learning by 2004.

## **Cross Government Target on Teenage Pregnancy**

- To reduce the Under 18 conception rate by 50% by 2010 and establish a downward trend in the conception rate for Under 16's;
- For 60% of 16 19 year old mothers to be in employment, education and training by 2010.

## **Shared Target with the Home Office**

- For 90% of 13 18 year olds, supervised by Youth Offending Teams, to be in education, training and employment by March 2004;
- To refer young people, with a drug related problem, to specialist support.

## SECTION 3 VISION OF THE EDUCATION SERVICE

# **Derby City Council - Education Service Vision Statement**

Derby City Council's vision is

To build on Derby's heritage and skills to make it a modern city that attracts businesses and visitors and where everyone can live safely, harmoniously, and achieve their full potential.

A major objective is for an education service where provision responds to people's needs, so they can develop skills and knowledge all through their lives, leading to better life choices and chances.

Linked to this, the vision for the Education Service is that

Learning brings success. Excellent learning opportunities throughout life will bring better life choices and chances. The development and success of children, young people and adults in the city is our shared, key focus.

To achieve this, our key priorities are:

- High quality, universal provision
- Targeting disadvantage and disaffection
- Investment in staff

At the same time, we will:

- Support creativity and innovation in learning
- Bring in as much funding as possible, join it up and pursue sustainability.
- 3.1 The Service will make a major contribution to addressing two of the key priorities in the Corporate Plan:
  - Improving children's and young people's prospects, and
  - Improving life chances for disadvantaged people and communities.

Our aim is that Derby should be a true CITY OF LEARNING.

- 3.2 In pursuit of our vision, there are a number of service priorities for the contribution of the City Council's Education Service, working with our partners in the City.
  - Improving the prospects of Derby's residents;
  - Targeting the needs of disadvantaged communities and groups:
  - Developing the structure, improving support.

#### 2004-05 PRIORITIES

Following on from the 2003-04 Youth Service Plan the Service has consulted with all its Youth teams, with key Partner Agencies and young people to produce the following work priorities and tasks. The work tasks and actions are located within the following seven priority sections which in themselves reflect the key principles and priorities of Resourcing Excellent Youth Services, the City Council and the Derby City Partnership and Derbyshire Connexions Partnership.

Service priorities for 2003-04 are:

- Supporting key Connexion Partnership targets;
- Supporting vulnerable young people;
- Supporting young people's involvement in the design and delivery of services;
- Improving and extending the range of Social Education Opportunities;
- Improve the quality and profile of youth work;
- Develop effective partnerships with the voluntary Youth Sector;
- Reduce Youth Crime and promote Community Cohesion.

## Key Tasks for 2004-05

The plan identified many actions to be undertaken and achieved this year with the following being identified as key tasks for 2004-05.

- Supporting the development of youth facilities on parks;
- Establishment of a Mobile Youth Project in targeted Neighbourhood Renewal Strategy neighbourhoods;
- Supporting the development of a new Youth and Community Pavilion on Vicarage Park;
- Developing a new guidance and support structure for evening youth provision;
- Completion of refurbishments of Southgate and Firs Youth Centres;
- Increased participation in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme:
- Undertaking the Ofsted Self Assessment of the present performance of the Service.

## **Youth Service Objectives**

The Youth Service's objectives form a curriculum framework within which youth workers develop programmes of support and activity to meet the expressed needs of young people and the priorities set by local and national government and partner agencies.

The Derby Youth Service is a key partner within the Derbyshire Connexions Partnership and the Derby Local Connexions Partnership.

The key function of the Service in supporting the targets of the Connexions Partnership include:

- Providing a wide range of high quality social education opportunities
- Providing a wide range of specialist referral services targeted at the needs of specific at risk groups, including Youth Information and Young Runaways
- Delivering the Preferred Supplier Contract for the involvement of young people in the Connexions Service

The Service is in regular contact with some of the city's most vulnerable young people.

The majority of this work is undertaken through multi-agency strategies and partnerships with youth workers often playing the key role of engaging regularly with young people with a range of risk factors.

The Service has, in partnership with schools, Housing, Police, Health, Social Services, Voluntary Organisations and Sure Start secured significant funding to develop innovative and imaginative projects.

The Service is currently working with the following vulnerable groups of young people.:

- Teenage Parents
- Young people at risk of sexual exploitation
- Young people who run away from home
- Afro Caribbean young people
- Pakistani boys and young men
- Young people with special educational needs
- · Young people at risk of being involved in crime
- Gay and lesbian young people
- Young people in care of the local authority
- Secondary school pupils experiencing difficulties with their behaviour and attendance

Much of this work has been established through effective inter-agency needs analysis and targeting resources to those young people most at risk. In a number of notable cases the Youth Service has taken a lead agency role resulting in the development of the following innovative specialist projects:

- The EDGE Project supporting young people at risk of sexual exploitation
- **The Derby Runaways Project** a National Flagship project, supporting the needs of young people who run away from home or care
- The OASIS Young Tenants Project supporting the needs of young parents living in Derby Homes accommodation
- The Pakistani Young People's Project providing targeted support to boys and young men of Pakistani origin to improve their life chances

In addition to these projects the Service has a wide range of specialist projects supporting the needs of young people with special educational needs, including:

- Enbees Youth Project for young people with learning difficulties
- Hands and Voice for deaf and hearing impaired young people
- St Clare's and St Martin's After School Projects for young people with special educational needs

## Progress in 2003/04

There has been significant progress and success achieved within many of the projects, this includes:

- New Disability Co-ordinator post achieves very positive outcomes
- OASIS Project securing sufficient funding to support 75 Tenants
- The EDGE and Runaways Projects securing additional City council core funding
- Black Shadow Group successful 'Young Film Makers' Video Project
- Two new special needs projects established
- High numbers of boys and young men engaged in the Pakistani Youth Project
- Runaways Project supporting a 21% reduction in young people who run away from home

# **Key Priorities for 2004/05**

The Service will continue to invest Transforming Youth Work Development Fund resources into the Runaways Project. SENDA funding will be invested in the continuation of the Disability Coordinator's post and access facilities at the proposed Outdoor and Environmental Education Centre.

Other priorities include:

- Redefine the remits of the EDGE and Runaways Projects
- Co-ordinate the successful review of the OASIS Project
- Expand Sporting aNd Outdoor Education opportunities for young people with special needs
- Continue funding of youth worker posts within the Gatsby Project
- Secure long term funding for the Pakistani Youth Project
- Complete work on the Southgate Specialist Sports facility

# PRIORITY 3 - SUPPORTING YOUNG PEOPLE'S ACTIVE INVOLVEMENT IN THE DESIGN AND DELIVERY OF SERVICES

One of the key objectives for the Derby Youth Service is Providing a Voice for Young People. Young people have the right to be consulted and play an active part in decision-making. Young people's active involvement in the delivery and development of youth service provision is central to the success of the Youth Service.

Young people are encouraged to be involved in the Youth Service in the following ways:

- Making decisions about programme planning, recruitment of staff and giving feedback on the service in a range of settings.
- As members of the Youth Forum, a key development in the City Council to involve young people. Youth workers support young people and have played an important role in establishing the Forum.
- The Youth Service will ensure that young people are involved in the Connexions Service Partnership.
- Support has been provided to the Freedom Forum, representing the views of disabled young people.
- Ensuring that any involvement of young people is inclusive and is representative of the range of young people within the community.
- Young people are actively involved in the design of new services.
- Surveys of users of the service carried out on a regular basis and the results used in future planning

## **Quality Work**

The Transforming Youth Work Development Fund (TYWDF) criteria placed significant emphasis on the raising of quality within the Youth Service.

A substantial part of our TYWDF has been used to establish a Quality Unit for the Youth Service. The overall aim of the Unit is to:

Raise the quality of work with young people by developing a supportive system of internal inspections, improving quality assurance procedures and providing accurate data on the needs of young people.

## **Marketing and Publicity**

Some of the projects which have been developed over the last few years have had a clear publicity strategy which has contributed to the positive response from young people.

Our aim for 2004/2005 is to build on existing good practice and develop a publicity/marketing strategy for the whole service.

## **Staff Development**

There have been significant developments in initial youth work training during the last year. We have been successful in our applications for Centre and Course approval for the new Initial Training Programme for part time and voluntary youth workers. The first run of the new course started in September 2003, consisting of workers from the Youth Service and local partner agencies.

We continue to deliver an extensive programme of in service training courses based on responses from our training needs analysis.

### PRIORITY 7 - REDUCING YOUTH CRIME AND SUPPORTING COMMUNITY COHESION

The Youth Service has for many years played an important role in reducing youth crime, both through its building based provision and detached projects.

Excellent links have been established between the Youth Offending Service (YOS) in particular through their Anti Social Behaviour Teams and the development of Positive Activities for Young People (PAYP).

Tackling youth crime is a major local priority and the Derby Community Safety partnership is the key co-ordinating body for the development of strategies to reduce crime in the city.

The Youth Service, in partnership with others, contributes to youth crime reduction in the following ways:

- Detached youth work teams deployed in 10 wards
- Support to local multi-agency groups established to tackle the issues of disruptive behaviour
- Advocacy and mediating on behalf of young people
- Provision of a wide range of social education activities
- Key involvement in the PAYP partnership
- Targeted work to tackle Community Cohesion issues in college, school and community settings
- Development of 3 new neighbourhood youth work posts specifically set up to tackle the issues of disruptive behaviour
- Inter-agency task groups including YOS, Police, Parks and Elected Members
- Establishment of Youth Shelters and other park facilities
- Work with young people at risk of sexual exploitation

## 2003-04 Achievements

Significant progress has been made on a number of fronts this year, in particular the partnership agreement established between the Youth Service and New Deal for Communities to fund a Young People's Co-ordinator Post. The post-holder will co-ordinate the development of a coherent youth strategy for the Derwent New Deal area.

Other key achievements include:

- Establishment of 3 half-time Neighbourhood Youth Worker posts in Spondon, Keldholme and Mickleover
- Postive referral system and support programme established with Noel Baker School
- Draft Guidelines for Detached Work produced
- Establishment of a new Young People's Co-ordinator post in the New Deal area
- Good quality Summer Activity Programme delivered
- Funding for new Mobile Youth Project secured
- Local Authority Capital Funding secured for the Vicarage Park Pavilion

### 2004-05 Priorities

This new year provides the Service with a number of exciting challenges. Two of the priorities relate directly to Cabinet decision on the allocation of capital funding to provide new facilities for young people on Derby Parks.

In March this year Cabinet approved the allocation of £150,000 to establish new park equipment such as skateboard ramps and sports wall.

Cabinet also approved the allocation of £335,000 to support the development of a new Youth and Community room facility on Vicarage Park.

Both projects being specifically designed to encourage young people to use parks more purposefully and reduce levels of disruptive behaviour in targeted wards.

£55,000 of Neighbourhood Renewal funding has also been secured to develop a Mobile Youth Project targeted at the Woodlands and Austin estates, plus others to be identified.

Other key priorities include:

- Developing closer and more coherent links with the YOS in delivering a comprehensive range of support in targeted wards of the city
- Developing a Youth Strategy for the Derwent New Deal Area
- Support Parks and young people to establish new young people's facilities as part of the City council corporate strategy priorities
- Seek funding to continue the OASIS crime diversion programme at Noel Baker
- Support Mickleover Action Group with the development of their Business Plan.

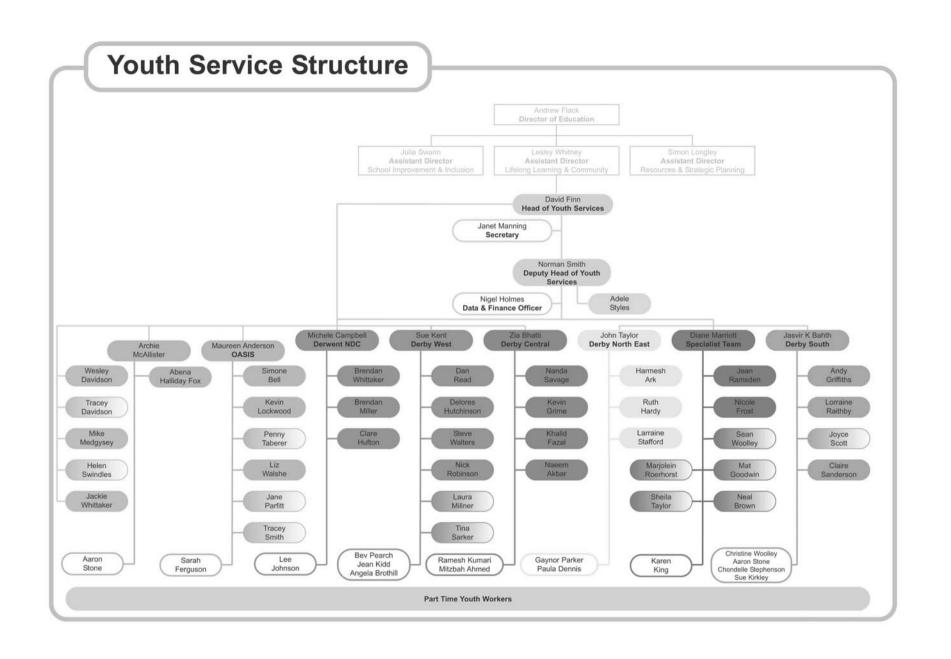

#### **Transforming Youth Work Development Fund Plan 2004/05**

#### **Introduction**

Since 2002, the Transforming Youth Work development Funds have enabled us to support a number of key initiatives within the Youth Service in Derby.

Our Previous TYWDF plans have concentrated on:

- Supporting the development of the Youth Service Quality Unit;
- Building capacity within the voluntary sector;
- Contributing towards the development of innovative Youth Service projects;
- Contributing towards the East Midlands Regional Youth Work Unit;
- Supporting the delivery of Initial Training and In-Service Training courses for Youth Workers.

It is our intention to continue with these key priorities in our plan for 2004/05.

The key activities for 2004/05 are as follows:

#### 1. The Youth Service Quality Unit

- 50% funding for Data and Finance Officer;
- Funding for part-time youth worker as member of inspection team;
- Complete self assessment as part of new OFSTED inspection framework;
- Continue to undertake internal inspections;
- To introduce Youth-base management information system.

#### 2. Building capacity within the Voluntary Sector

- Develop a service level agreement with Derby CVS for voluntary sector development worker;
- Support voluntary youth organisations in successfully applying for the Connexions Youth Support Award;
- Consolidate the Voluntary Sector Action Forum and support for new developments;
- Establish joint youth project with St Joseph's Church, including providing funding for two part-time workers.

#### 3. Contribution to the Derby Runaways Project

- Continuation of range of support services to young people within the current capacity of the project;
- Delivery of targeted PSHE package in four schools in the city;

• Reduce numbers of initial runaways by 5%.

## 4. Contribution to the East Midlands Regional Youth Work Unit

Agreed financial support from East Midlands Local Authority Youth Services for EMRYWU.

## 5. Training Programme

Contribution towards training programme, including:

- Initial Training Course for unqualified part-time youth workers;
- Delivery of In-Service Training Calendar based on training needs analysis completed by all staff.

# DERBY CITY COUNCIL YOUTH SERVICE 2004 SENDA PLAN

#### INTRODUCTION

The previous two years of SENDA funding has given significant assistance to the Youth Service in both improving facilities for young people with disabilities, and extending the range of activity through the newly established 'Disability Co-ordinator' post.

The Capital Fund has been utilised with both City Council and external funding streams to maximise the opportunity to improve access at specialist facilities.

This years priorities build upon this good work, and the partnership opportunities to joint fund projects.

We intend to utilise the capital and revenue elements of our allocation based on the figures given via GOEM's Transforming Youth Work Development Fund letter of 17 March 2004.

Derby City's allocations are:

Capital £22,165 Revenue £ 4.926

#### CAPITAL EXPENDITURE PROJECTS

# Project 1 - Outdoor and Environmental Education Centre – Darley Park Barn , Darley Park

The Youth Service is leading on this imaginative NOF Project to establish a brand new Outdoor and Environmental Centre, primarily for young people.

The Centre will provide specialist canoeing facilities, being located very close to the River Derwent, and the Duke of Edinburgh's Award expedition preparation.

The environmental education opportunities are endless due to natural parkland environment and the river. The area contains a nature reserve, and is part of the Derwent Valley World Heritage Site.

The Centre will be used primarily by schools during term time, and statutory and voluntary youth organisations on an evening, weekend and bank holidays.

The funding will be used to ensure appropriate access facilities are in place at the Centre, including a lift, toilet and shower, and learning aids such as flashing lights for the hearing impaired.

Total capital allocation for this project is £12,165 which will contribute to a total capital cost for the Centre of £420,000.

#### Project 2 – King George V Park, New Youth Club Facility

The King George V Park is situated in the Littleover Ward of the City. The ward has suffered from an established pattern of disruptive behaviour from young people. Unfortunately the area has no suitable building in which to house a youth club.

The City Council's Parks Department recently offered the use of the Park Pavilion to run a youth club. The building is in good condition, being sited some distance from housing and adjacent to playing fields.

The Pavilion requires some refurbishment, including disabled toilet facilities. The City Council recently approved an allocation of £50,000 to assist towards the refurbishment of the building.

The Service wishes to contribute £10,000 of SENDA funding to assist with the refurbishment, and specifically to finance the construction of a disabled toilet facility.

This is again a very good partnership development, and we will be making approaches to the Local Area Panel for further funding.

Total SENDA contribution to Project 2 is £10,000.

#### REVENUE DEVELOPMENT

As mentioned in the introduction, the establishment of a 'Disability Co-ordinator' post within the staffing structure of the Service has brought tremendous benefit to the quality, quantity and co-ordination of activities and support for young people with special educational needs.

The cut in revenue funding will be made up from mainstream resources. The Service has already agreed to mainstream the following new projects, which were originally funded by some SENDA money:

- St Clare's After School Club
- St Martin's After School club
- Mandela BME Special Needs Project

The priorities for work this year include:

- Increasing the numbers of young people participating in Outdoor Education Activities;
- Establish Health & Relationships Programme at St Clares;
- Establish an Archery Course for young people with a hearing impairment;
- Enable more young people to access the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme;
- Assess the possibility in establishing an E to E Scheme for NEET young people with educational special needs;

• Produce draft policy guidelines for the work.

A more detailed action plan is included within the 2004-05 Youth Service Plan within the 'Supporting Vulnerable Young People' section.

Total revenue contribution from SENDA is £4,926.
