


## Sunday 8th May —12pm to 4pm

Taking place throughout March 2011, Celebrating RE is a month long celebration of Religious Education in schools, colleges, universities, faith and belief communities and local communities throughout England and Wales. Its purpose is to celebrate the contribution that high quality RE can make to the education of every child and young person. It also aims to raise public awareness and understanding of the nature of RE as a subject which is relevant, challenging, interesting and of educational value to all, whatever their religious or philosophical background.

#### What is the Board of Deputies doing?

 $\rightarrow$  For the whole month of March, we are displaying our "Jewish Way of Life Exhibition" (JWOLE) at the Greenwich Heritage Centre in the Royal Arsenal in Woolwich. It will be open to schools, youth groups, community groups and museum visitors. Our display will be enhanced by the addition of information from the Jewish Military Museum, and we are exploring specific links between Jewish ex-servicemen and the Royal Artillery Regiment.

ightarrow Staff from the BoD's Education team will be judging competitions and Sandra Teacher, our Education Consultant, will be speaking as a 'faith expert' at a national conference entitled "Whose RE is it anyway"

## NEWS FROM PARLIAMENT...



This is a busy time in terms of National RE policy and there are various high-profile RE stories that you may have heard about:

#### The Review of the National Curriculum

Some people have raised concerns that RE has been left out of the review of the National Curriculum. Please be assured that RE remains a compulsory subject as part of the wider curriculum in schools. The review documents state that "the Government does not intend to make any changes to the statutory basis for religious education." The current model of Locally Agreed Syllabi determined by SACREs is being retained which is good news as some groups have been campaigning for it to be brought into the National Curriculum so that there is tighter governmental control over content. We of course know the value of the SACRE model and the locally relevant and specific curricula that it produces and so we welcome the fact that the new government will be keeping this system in place.

### Including RE as a Humanities subject on the English Baccalaureate?

The EBacc has been introduced by the government as a way to measure achievement across a range of "core academic subjects" studied at GCSE. It is not a new gualification in itself, but is awarded to any student who passes GCSEs in English, Maths, Science, a foreign language and a humanities subject. In the 2010 league tables, RE was not included as a humanities subject which could count towards the EBacc. Professional RE associations, together with faith groups and many concerned teachers and parents have been campaigning to ensure that RE is included in next years listing of EBacc qualifying subjects. This is important as RE must be recognised as the valuable subject that it is, but also as it runs the risk of being marginalised and under-resourced by schools if it does not count towards their position in the league tables.

### **Teaching RE in Academies and Free Schools**

Academies are independent schools which receive their funding direct from the government, as opposed to through their Local Authority. One of the freedoms afforded to academies is that they are not obliged to follow the National Curriculum; they can choose their own curriculum, as long as it is "broad and balanced. NATRE (National Association of Teachers of RE) contacted the Department of Education about the place of RE in academies and received the following heartening reply: "In accordance with their funding agreement, where an Academy has not been designated with a religious character the Academy must ensure that religious education is given to all pupils at the Academy in accordance with the requirements for locally agreed syllabuses. This means that syllabus reflects the fact that the religious traditions in Great Britain are in the main Christian whilst taking account of the teaching and practices of the other principal religions represented in Great Britain. 'Trust schools that are designated faith schools have to teach RE in accordance with the tenets of the faith. If they are not designated faith schools they must teach the locally agreed syllabus."

# Ongoing projects at the Board .....

Seeing Jewish Life (SJL) Tours give pupils a chance to experience the vibrant Jewish way of life in its own environment. These trips are an excellent opportunity to witness the dynamics that exist within the contemporary Jewish community of London.

SJL tours can be tailor-made to meet the needs of the individual school. The tours may include: a tour of a synagogue, workshops at the newly refurbished Jewish Museum in Camden, meeting a Holocaust survivor, visiting Jewish shops, schools or care homes and enjoying a kosher meal. Each group is accompanied by a trained volunteer guide who will provide an insight into the Anglo-Jewish community.
