Children and Young People's Plan 2008 - 2011

RECOMMENDATION

1. To note further progress on the development of the Children and Young People's Plan 2008 – 2011 prior to submission to a meeting of the full Council on 21 May 2008.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 2.1 The Children and Young People's Plan 2008 2011 will be published as a two-part document. Part one includes the over-arching principles, priorities and outcomes, needs analysis and a summary of the resources available to support the plan. A working draft of part one has already been considered by the Children and Young People's Commission.
- 2.2 Attached to this report is the working draft of part two of the plan. Part two will form the performance management framework detailing information in relation to actions, activities, targets and lead responsible officer.
- 2.3 Although the overarching plan is a three-year document, Part two, the action plan only covers the period 2008 -09 as it will need to be reviewed and rewritten in preparation for the Comprehensive Area Assessment process in 2009.
- 2.4 Each of the five Every Child Matters outcomes has an action plan detailing two key actions for each of the over-arching strategic priorities in the plan.
- 2.5 These action plans will become the working document for the five outcome groups to monitor, review and develop over the coming 12 months.
- 2.6 It is intended that progress on the key actions will be reported on a half-yearly basis to a range of stakeholders, including the Children and Young People Commission.

IMPLICATIONS

Financial

- 1.1 The plan must include a section on the resources that will support our actions. This will be relatively broad brush, covering those resources agreed by the Council and partner agencies as part of their normal, annual budget-making process. All of the actions proposed in the plan will need to be delivered within existing resources, including any external grant opportunities, and working together to secure increased effectiveness wherever possible.
- 1.2 The Local Area Agreement, with its aligned and pooled budget arrangements, has a children and young people's block which relates closely to this plan and will support delivery of some of its priorities.

2. Whilst there is a relaxation for excellent authorities, the overall expectation in the Children Act 2004 is that authorities should agree with partner agencies an overarching children and young people's plan. It is clear that this will be a central focus of Annual Performance Assessment and future Comprehensive Area Assessment that will begin from self-evaluation and progress on the plan.

Personnel

3. None directly to this report. However, achieving joined-up action between staff in partner agencies and developing the workforce to address the children and young people's agenda are challenging but vital aspects of our work.

Equalities impact

- 4.1 Achieving equity and excellence across children and young people's services are important underlying themes of our work. Narrowing gaps and opportunities are inherent in the five outcomes for children and young people.
- 4.2 The new Children and Young People's Plan will be subject to equality impact assessment before formal approval by Cabinet and Council.
