Area Panel Budget Proposals 2005/6

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 1.1 Area Panel 1 budget allocation for 2005/6 is £29,000. The panel has an additional budget of £2,891 carried forward from 2004/5, which means that a total budget of £31,891 is available for allocation to projects during this financial year.
- 1.2 The area panel is asked to consider whether to support the following applications:

- 1.6 The Council Constitution states that the Area Panels can 'use a delegated budget for local environmental and community purposes'. Therefore, if an application does not specifically refer to a local activity, consideration needs to be given to the appropriateness of allocating area panel funding to the project. In deciding whether to support each application, the area panel will assess the funding request against the funding criteria and its priorities.
- 1.7 The new funding criteria, included in the Council Constitution, says that applications need to provide a service in response to the needs of local residents and meet at least one of the following criteria:
 - improve access for local people to existing services
 - provide a service in response to an issue raised in a community update report
 - contribute to improvements which will provide a benefit to local residents
 - assist in providing an integrated service in response to an issue raised at an area panel meeting
 - enable residents to participate in their community or at area panel meetings.

Applications also need to:

- provide evidence of need for the application
- show evidence that ongoing maintenance or revenue costs have been approved by the relevant Council department, if necessary.
- 1.8 The priorities for supporting an application are that it:
 - is from a voluntary or community group
 - shows evidence of match funding or self help
 - provides a service in response to the needs of local residents
 - will directly benefit people living in the geographical area covered by the area panel
 - show evidence of how the project will be sustained beyond the period of funding, if it is not a one-off project
 - contributes to the delivery of one or more of the Council's corporate objectives.
- 1.9 In most circumstances, the amount of funding that the area panel will award to an applicant will be between £50 and £2,000. However, the area panel does have the discretion to award more if it considers the application to be a priority for the area.

Appendix 1

IMPLICATIONS

Financial

1.1 Area panels must consider priorities within the area when considering requests for funding. Not all requests that meet the criteria will be considered a priority. When supporting or rejecting an application over £25,000, Area Panel 1 must give reasons for its decision.

Legal

- 2.1 Area Panel 1 has delegated authority to use its budget for local environmental and community purposes.
- 2.2 Section 19 of the Local Government (Miscellaneous Provisions) Act 1976 empowers the Council to offer grants to voluntary and other organisations to provide any recreational facilities.
- 2.3 Any decision involving the making of a grant or loan over £25,000 to any voluntary body is deemed to have a significant impact on two or more wards and is therefore a key decision.
- 2.4 After a key decision has been taken, the Director of Corporate Services must publish a record of every executive decision taken at that meeting within two days of that meeting. The record must include a statement of the reasons for each decision and any alternative options considered or rejected at the meeting. No action will be taken on any such decision for five clear days from the date of publication.

Appendix 2

SUMMARY OF APPLICATIONS

Applicant 1: Chaddesden Park Allotment Association

Project: Security Fencing for Site

Total cost of project: £8,000 approximately

Amount of funding requested: £800

Wards: Oakwood

Description:

A grant of £3,200 was approved at the meeting on 7 September from the Chaddesden allocation of funding. It was agreed to defer consideration of allocating £800 from the Oakwood ward until the next meeting.

The Chaddesden Park Allotment Association based on Parkside has about 60 members and of these about 50 live in Chaddesden ward and about 10 live in Oakwood ward. The association was formed in the 1960s.

The Association want to continue their security fencing project. Area Panel 1 allocated £3,506 in the last financial year to start the project to improve security around the allotments. This involves replacing poor hedging and poor existing fencing with secure 1.8 metre high steel palisade fencing. The group received £ 3,506 from Area Panel 1 in 2004/5 to start replacing and repairing the existing fencing between their allotment site and Chaddesden Park. This resulted in an increase in membership however the Association is keen to complete the security fencing in order to keep these new members and to tackle the recent spate of damage and break ins suffered by the Association.

The Association started the project by replacing part of the boundary that faces Chaddesden Park and they now want to complete the fencing up to Parkside Road. The cost of buying this fencing is £4,000 and the Association are installing all the fencing themselves which represents a saving of nearly 30% on the costs if installed by a contractor.

This fencing will protect the most vulnerable parts of the site where there have been three break ins in July and six in June of which four involved damage reported to the Police.

To help complete the project the Association have purchased 1.8metre high metal Harris fencing to prevent access to the northern part of the allotment site.

It was proposed to allocate funds from both Chaddesden ward - £3,200 and Oakwood ward - £800 in line with where the members of the association live.

Applicant 2: Windyridge Women's Institute

Project: Room Hire

Total cost of project: £300
Amount of funding requested: £300

Wards: Chaddesden and Derwent

Description:

The application was deferred at the meeting on 7 September to allow more details to be provided about the application. In response the group have supplied the following additional information:

- Financial support is only being requested from the area panel for this financial year.
- We used to share the cost of the hire of the room at da Vinci Community College with Adult Community Education, but since they have not had their classes at the school our room rental has increased
- We do our own fundraising through raffles/sales tables on the members meeting night, but this money goes someway to paying for our monthly speakers whose fees range from £15 to £30 depending on where in the country they are travelling from. These fees are ever increasing particularly now with fuel costs rising.
- We have been in existence since 1977 and have had a membership of 50 but as members 'pass on' and move out of the area so our funds decrease as a result and so it gets a little harder to find that little bit of extra money to pay for the essential.
- When the new college is built with facilities for the not so active members of the community we have been promised ground floor accommodation for our meetings. We will then go out to promote ourselves in conjunction with the opening of the new college. A tree planting ceremony is already in place.
- We have recently had an opportunity at the local church 50th celebration to promote membership, and we are always advertising in our local paper. We are also having a Coffee Morning in the Mayor's Parlour on the 9th December, again to help with fundraising for the next financial year

This project is to cover the room hire costs at the da Vinci Community College for 11 months from December 2005 to November 2006. For ten months the charge is £26 for our monthly meetings held in a classroom with extended kitchen facilities. There is a £40 charge when they have the school hall for an open evening for the community and local groups to come in and join the meeting. At this annual event extra activities such as Thai chi and dancing are put on which needs lots of space.

We plan to sustain the group as it has been over the last 28 years. They aim to apply to the Mayor's charity or a Lottery Grant for further funding next year.

The group have already been successful in receiving funding from Mew Beal for 50 chairs.

Applicant 3: Chaddesden Wood Local Nature Reserve Management

Advisory Committee

Project: Installation of Marker Posts and Signs

Total cost of project: £2,270

Amount of funding requested: £1,770

Wards: Oakwood

Description:

The application was deferred at the meeting on 7 September 2005 to allow the Chaddesden Wood Local Nature Reserve Management Advisory Committee to confirm who would be responsible for maintenance and whether the existing signs were being maintained.

It has been confirmed that Derby Parks are cleaning the existing signs including the removal of any graffiti. Derby Parks have confirmed that they will be responsible for maintaining any new markers installed by Chaddesden Wood Local Nature Reserve Management Advisory Committee.

The Chaddesden Wood Local Nature Reserve Management Advisory Committee was formed in 1991. The site has long been designated a Local Nature Reserve in recognition of its locally valuable conservation merit. It is managed in accordance with a formally adopted management plan that has support of all stakeholders such as the Forestry Commission, English Nature Derbyshire Wildlife Trust and Derby City Council.

However, there is nothing on the site that communicates works on site or that details its nature conservation value – this is considered a missed opportunity by community representatives of the Management Advisory Committee. It is estimated that the visitor numbers run to thousands a year. The group believe 90% of those benefiting live in the surrounding area.

The Management Advisory Committee have requested better provision of interpretation material to support the Local Nature Reserve's nature trail leaflet and to raise the profile of the site.

This project involves installing 10 nature trail markers posts at points of interest and installing a sign at Springwood Drive entrance to advise visitors about conservation and the objectives of Local Nature Reserve management.

The project seeks to develop a community facility in the form of a nature trail. The markers and sign will enhance the experience of visitors, educate them about this environmental facility. It also aims to encourage local use and provide a shared learning opportunity that can be independently experienced by visitors.

Applicant 4: Tuesday Senior Citizens Club

Project: Day trips for senior citizens

Total cost of project: varies

Amount of funding requested: £200

Wards: Derwent

Description:

The club meets in the sheltered scheme on Coniston Crescent and are requesting funding to help with transport costs for the Tuesday and Thursday Senior Citizens Clubs that are run by residents for residents.

The funding will be put towards coaches for when day trips are arranged for the Tuesday and Thursday Clubs. They are usually arranged in May, July, September and December.

At present residents have to pay £2.05 a week which includes subs to pay for the coaches for days out. Social Services provide £385 a year to pay for tea, milk and refreshments. The club encourages visitors to also take part on days out as they will help pay for the coaches which means less money spent from the account, so the remaining money can be spent on other activities.

The clubs enable the residents to participate in their community by having a place to meet weekly allowing residents to socialise with one another. They also arrange day trips out, if this service was not here a lot of the residents would not get out.

The project will be sustained after the area panel funding by the ongoing 'subs' from the residents who meet weekly.

Suggested recommendation from the Area Panel Grant Appraisal Panel

Reject. The Appraisal panel considered that there was no evidence that showed the club needed the funding for its activity. The application indicates that subscriptions amount to over £3,000.

Applicant 5: 66th Derby (1st Spondon) Scout Group **Project:** Scout headquarters kitchen renovation

Total cost of project: £ 6,000 Amount of funding requested: £ 3,000 Wards: Spondon

Description:

The Scout HQ has been in Stoney Lane Spondon since 1976 and the kitchen facilities have not received any major overhaul during that period. The kitchen is currently used mainly by Scouts and Spondon Youth Club, but is also available to other users of the premises. Scouts use cooking and washing facilities in the kitchen as part of 'badge work'. The kitchen also provides refreshment facilities during social events such as bonfire night celebrations and 'fund raisers'. It is also used for meals during sleepover events. The Youth Club also provides cooking experience for its young people and we understand that they particularly value this facility. The current equipment in the kitchen comprises domestic-standard items, which have seen a lot of wear and tear.

We want to replace items which are becoming defunct and improve the usability of the kitchen by altering the layout. We also want to improve the hygiene by installing catering-standard stainless steel units and work surfaces, having a separate sink for hand washing and improving the ventilation. We also intend to improve the personnel security and ergonomics of the building by introducing some small windows into the kitchen because it currently has none.

This project is to renovate the kitchen in the scout hut and the Scouts are requesting £3,000 towards the total cost of £6,000. It includes re-flooring and wall tiling, replacement of sink, cooker, table, work surfaces and cupboards and provision of refrigerator and kitchen accessories.

Once installed, the refurbished kitchen will not incur significant on-going costs. Routine maintenance will be paid for out of Scout Group funds.

Other funding will come from Spondon Scout fundraising activities of £1,500 and Spondon Scout Group funds of £1,500. There will also be some volunteer labour for work such as stripping the old kitchen out. The total costs are £6,000 and made up of:

- Floor tiles £ 600
- Wall tiles £ 400
- Windows £1,200
- Stainless steel benches & shelves -£1,000
- Sinks & taps -£ 400
- 6 ring cooker, double oven -£ 800
- Extractor system -£ 400
- Cutlery and crockery (25 places) £ 400
- Appliances (including toaster, boiler, fridge) £ 400
- Saucepans, utensils, accessories £ 400

Applicant 6: Derwent into Gardening

Project: Plants on wheels

Total cost of project: £ 4,053Amount of funding requested: £ 2,000Wards: Derwent

Description:

We now want to purchase an exhibition trailer for the Derwent Into Gardening group to transport tables, chairs, gazebo, information and plants to events in Derwent to encourage wider participation. The cost of the trailer, including hitch lock, wheel clamp and spare wheel is £3701.25 inc VAT. Advertising signs on the Trailer will cost £352.50 inc VAT. Giving a total of £4053.75. We are asking for a contribution of £2,000. The match funding of £2,053 for the trailer is from £2,000 from the Community Action Small Grants Programme which the group have gained as a result of attending several courses at Trafford Hall in Chester. We will meet the additional cost of £53.75 from our existing income

Derwent into Gardening was set up in July 2003 by a group of residents in Derwent who wanted to swap seeds and plants. Over 100 residents became involved and it developed into group who grew flowers, herbs and vegetables and involved children in holiday time. The group aims to promote the value of gardening, healthy eating and promoting communities in Derwent.

We arrange trips both locally and nationally and have developed links with other organisations such as the Environmental and Sustainability Unit the Green Gym and Evergreen Normanton. There is now a regular children's group called the 'Little Weeds' which has 26 members.

We are renting a community garden on Wiltshire Road and now attend local events to sell our products. We have stalls at Selkirk Street, Walbrook Housing and other Sheltered Housing Schemes to supply quality plants to residents at reasonable prices. We also have stalls at Derby Homes Fun Days where we give advice to Derby Homes residents as well as selling plants. Another future project for Spring 2006 is assisting some residents with a communal garden in a sheltered housing scheme with support from ENCAMS, the NEAT project and the Princes Trust. We hope that this will be the first of many similar projects.

Allotment holders are also encouraged to bring produce to sell at our events to encourage healthier eating. We are also linking with the PCT and Revive Healthy Living Centre who are offering us support with space for growing and also office space. Also at all our events we bring in artists to provide a selection of arts and crafts for all ages.

We are working towards improving the look of the area by encouraging residents to look after their gardens. We purchase pots, compost and plants from local businesses wherever possible to help improve the local economy.

Up to now most of our funds have been spent setting up the garden and greenhouse. By March 2006 there will be very little spending required for the garden so all profits will go back into the project for training

We aim to sustain the group through selling and 15 members of the group will be directly involved with growing plants/selling at plant sales and another 15 members are involved with events. We have received financial support and support in kind from a number of organisations including The Derwent Community Team for a grant for the rent for the garden, furniture, public liability insurance, C.R.B checks and room hire until March 2007. We have raised enough money for a further year from our plant sales as well as money for compost, plug plants to start us off in the spring. We already have orders for hanging baskets.

The Derwent Empowerment Project is providing the use of the Ford Galaxy to tow the trailer to events. The vehicle and fuel is also available for the group for meetings and trips, free of charge. Living Derwent Arts and Cultural in Derwent provided funding for room hire for meetings for one year.

Derwent Time Bank now let us have the use of their meeting room in return for hours which gardening group members contribute. The Green Scheme supplied £500 towards the cost of the polycarbonate greenhouse, Making Things Happen, Small Grants awarded us £400 and the group raised the remaining £300 at plant sales. Volunteer's hours 3 volunteers to run stall at events during the season from April to October.

To be sustainable we may have to reduce the amount of charitable donations we make in the future
