"To provide support and a confidential service through an advice centre, refuge accommodation, outreach work and training for <u>ALL</u> women and children experiencing domestic violence, whilst addressing the needs of Black, Asian and other minority women.

Hadhari Nari believes that all women and children have the right to live in a society without the fear of violence. We will educate, empower and support to achieve this aim."



- Hallmark has sought to target the needs of BME (Black and Minority Ethnic) since 1989.
- The Association was originally founded through the merger of three community organisations, Hadhari Nari, Ujima Housing Association (Derby) and Unity Housing Association.
- Hallmark became a Registered Social Landlord with the Housing Corporation in 1991.
- Owns and manages approximately 550 properties









- work at a strategic level to promote the protection of women and children, by representing their needs to policy and decision makers
- work towards the long-term prevention of domestic violence through public awareness and education programmes
- work which supports the provision of services to meet the needs of all abused women and children

Refuge Support Services

- O Specialist refuge support services are vital for Black women and children.
- O Refuges can offer a range of services to enable women to:-
 - Share language, cooking and leisure facilities
 - Being able to freely conduct cultural and religious practices
 - Feel a sense of affinity with other residents/share problems
- O Research findings showed that many Black women preferred specialist services. A few preferred to be in mixed refuges to escape the stigma*
