6 Local Transport Plan Priorities – Aidan Ryrie

2021-22 update shared by LD on behalf of AR;

ATF Redwood School – Scheme started 22/11/2021. Initial reaction was very positive with lots of support being expressed from parents. A period of monitoring has begun with visits planned for the New Year to monitor the number of contraventions.

ATF Sinfin Lane Cycle Lane – Consultation has started. 12 weeks, ending Monday 14th February 2022. Visit https://letstalk.derby.gov.uk/cycle-lanes to engage in the consultation.

Ash Croft Primary - Deep Dale Lane. ATC surveys planned for Speed to include Wragley Way. Results still pending.

SID Faults – There's no repair budget. Balfours won't touch them. It costs a lot to get an engineer in from Swarco. In the past, faults emerge due to water ingress and generally return to normal without the need for an engineer.

SID Deployments – Report complete and is pending sign off. Intention is to move towards a simpler annual deployment process – details of new process to be shared with all Neighbourhood Boards in the New Year.

Traffic surveys (tubes) re: Deep Dale Lane and Wragley Way were installed on the 3rd December. The tubes will be removed on the 17th December. The data will be reviewed early in the New Year.

LD went through the above list of funding already approved. The board confirmed they were happy with all of the above and approved all that has currently been allocated.

There were three funding applications received for discussion, plus a proposal from Neighbourhoods for the purchase of ward equipment.

There were concerns expressed over the application from Springwater Community Group in relation to the sum of money requested, versus the actual ward need. Although the board is keen to support anyone in need, more evidence is required.

PD updated re the above, that as part of the work DF4TA are doing they are putting together a database, ward by ward of need/demand. This is due to be completed in the next few days. This would help to advise re ward need and funding.

Action: The board agreed to defer the application until this information is available to be looked at, for a decision to be made.

9 Neighbourhood Team Update

Report circulated with the minutes

Role of Neighbourhood Officer is going to be changing, the support will stay the same that we provide for the Councillors and the partnership working with community groups etc. All will be involved in the new way we'll be working. Partnership working is key, traffic, highways, ppo team etc.

Litter picks have been going well in the ward, getting to those areas most needed.

Swallowdale MUGA work will be replicated in the new way of working, in particular the principle behind it. Potential to replicate at Shakespeare Street. Case work on the report.

JT has put a proposal together to purchase some equipment for Sinfin ward. Agreed to allocate £500.00 for equipment.

MV to meet with JT to look at Sinfin Community Centre contributing to the purchase once items and costings have been confirmed, either to potentially match fund, or provide a contribution.

NP updated that Keepmoat have provided two planters, soil and Christmas trees for the Nightingale Road development. Lights and batteries were required to be purchased which NP did at a cost of £27.00. Agreed by the board to come from the board budget.

NP asked what was happening in relation to compactors and as Derby Homes funded two within the ward, could these be arranged? JT updated that

Partner reports were circulated prior to the meeting.

Police – MC updated that the October stats haven't as yet come through. Main increase is knife crime which ahs gone up. Going in to the schools with Project Zao. Op Wintershield in place targeting those areas where there has been intel. Increase in burglaries, method using is rear communal alleys. Community engagement back up and running. ASB has gone down.

NHS Derby CCG- RR gave a presentation of updates. Model is about flexible space Lorraine to circulate to board members with the minutes. Will hopefully be able to provide the layout design for the next board meeting. Outpatient options. Moving the library in to the building seen as a real positive.

Derby Homes – SW updated that she now has a full team covering the area. The ASB team have raised that there are tensions in Osmaston triangle and for staff to be aware when in the area. Few recent issues with weapons.

Cannabis craze in Sinfin via chews, children involved.

Voids – Falcon Way two flats, the tenants have been moved and it is going to be a potential re-development site.

Local priorities – looking at the format abit differently, more information going forward. Looking at statistics, with a further meeting in January, linking in and working with the neighbourhood board around #bettertogether.

Local Area Coordinator – KB's report had previously been circulated with the minutes. This will be the last Neighbourhood Board meeting, as going on maternity leave prior to the next meeting. Job advert going out for maternity cover.

Kirsty was wished all the best and thanked for her hard work being done in the ward.

Move More - AB updated regarding forever active 60+ who have sessions on Wednesday's chair based, £4 per session. Info on update. Derbyshire Mind started walk and talk every other Friday on Sinfin Moor Park.

Devolved Board Budgets

- 3.2 Board members agreed not to have specific funding priorities against which to accept funding proposals at this stage.
- 3.3 Please note all board spend must formally be approved by the ward committee which is a meeting of all three ward councillors. Two out of three councillors must agree for a decision to be formally approved.
 - Councillors through a Ward Committee meeting may also make decisions on board spend outside of Board meetings.

The following funding applications have been received, for consideration;

Derby Golf Club	Derby Golf Club is looking at the future and wanting to involve the local community especially the younger generation to help them to learn to play golf but to also belong to a community club and to also bring the club to the community to give people a place to go and also enable them to enjoy exercise and respect the area as well. The delivery of the project will be run by the academy manager who is a volunteer and their job is to crate an acamdemy. We also have the buy in for the club professional and the backing of the Management Team of Derby Golf Club. The project will be delivered at Derby Golf Course

(previously named Sinfin Golf Course). We also have in place appointments to speak to Schools incase certain parts can't be delivered at the course then if it could be done at Schools. The club has in place DBS checks and also safeguarding policies and are currently working with England Golf for SafeGolf accreditation which is expected to be awarded by the end of February. The Club also has a trained welfare office in place as well. All people involved are volunteers giving their time to the club and local community.

Costs: Try-Golf Equipment £350, Training Cost £150. Total - £500.00.

Ozzy Wheels

Derby City Council, Derby Homes and number of other partner and voluntary organisations have supported the community group Ozzy Wheels to successfully deliver a new BMX track at Osmaston park in October 2021. The funding for this track was provided by a partnership of Derby Homes and British Cycling and part of this funding was for a storage container which was installed next to the track site in August 2021. Ozzy Wheels is currently working towards establishing itself as a British Cycling club by Spring 2022 ready to begin delivering coached sessions at the track.

Consultation undertaken with Ozzy wheels volunteers and members has identified a need to create ownership of the container for the club and the local community to deter vandilism and damage to the container. This consultation has highlighted that having the container made up in graffiti art which has come from both riders and the local community will help to deter vandilism and any unwanted graffiti on the container. We are also proposing to leave one end of the container blank to be used as a community art wall which can be used at nominated time working in partnership with Babypeople to give young people the opourtunity to try graffiti art. This community art wall would be based on some community guidelines agreed in partnership with young people from Ozzy Wheels and the local community.

Derby Homes has an existing relationship with Babypeople who have been involved with numerious graffiti art projects in Sinfin and the wider city. Derby Homes have already undertaken some work with students at Ashwood Spencer where they created some artwork designs that can be used on the container. These designs were judged by the Ozzy Wheels group with the winners put forward to be used as artwork on the container.

As part of this project we are also intending to have the upper parts of the container walls sprayed with anti-climb paint and the relevant health and safety signage to deter people from climbing on the container and potentially hurting themselves.

Sporting Communiti es

We are seeking funding to provide positive activities for the young people living in Sinfin Ward.

Our project will be to run a youth club in the Sinfin ward where it is targeted at young people who may otherwise be hanging around street corners, getting involved in gangs and being exposed to toxic influences. The youth club will include arts, crafts and play with a flexible approach where by we work with the young people to provide activities suited to their wants and needs.

As a developmental path we will encourage volunteering to enable young people to give back to their communities, giving a greater sense of empowerment, ownership and connectedness. The aim is to divert young people away from ASB and crime to turn young people into a collective group that are providing a range of positive activities, removing barriers to progression and supporting them so they can become productive members of society and reach their full potential. This will allow young people to be a part of a solution in resolving issues that are important to them such as mental health, access to social activities to isolation that older people face - all things that young people from this community have expressed a need to address. This will also change the wider community's perception of young people into something more positive.

By building positive relationships with young people, we hope that this session can

become a place that young people can feel safe coming to and use as a space to relax or fulfil their ambitions.

Ward Walkabouts are now full steam ahead again. The next Ward Walkabout will be on 14.03.22 meeting at Osmaston Road, Near Co-op Shop, 5pm-6pm and on 11.04.22 meeting at Wordsworth Avenue, Near One stop, 5pm-6pm. We will be doing a litter pick for those that wish to join in.

The last Ward Walkabout was around Deep Dale Lane. With some of us litter picking, other Partners carried out a door knock. The door knock was to see what the extent of the speeding issues are in the area. However, we also received information regarding several other matters which is always helpful. Some of the issues are listed below:

- The parking around the school makes driving and crossing dangerous in the area
- Have noticed the speeding however not a lot
- Sometimes people drive fast but it is not too much of a problem
- Speeding happens a lot and the place the speed measurement device is in, is good as they usually speed up from the corner
- Sees and hears the speeding daily
- Would prefer speed bumps to speed cameras if a permanent speed reduction measure was to be put in place

Some other issues were mentioned:

- Wants a slide on Wragleys Way park
- Underpass puts one gentleman off walking to the park due to how dark and dingy it is, along with the paraphernalia on the floor

- Wanted more bins to go up near KFC and Starbucks to prevent future litter problems
- Wants more bins on lampposts in order to promote dog walkers putting the waste in the bin



Sinfin Ward Better Together/Locality Working

Just to give you an idea what Locality Working is all about please see below from a presentation slide:

Locality Working in Derby is about us working collaboratively and innovatively across our city to maximise the potential of our assets and communities. It is focused on strengthening partnership working between and with individual residents; businesses; community and voluntary groups; faith organisations; community leaders; Councillors ad public sector organisations. Where we all have an equal role to play in our city which has an abundance and wealth of assets; skills and resources.

Delivering a shared vision.

More information will be available on this way of working in the coming months. However, withing the Sinfin Ward and using available data we have come up with two priorities we will be working towards. They are as follows:

- Local People for Local Jobs/Youth and Unemployment
- Transforming Jitties/Rear Access Footways

Both above areas will concentrate primarily within Osmaston and Old Sinfin.

Both projects are early on with progress, but with a better way of working we will involve Cllrs, Key Partners, Community & Voluntary Groups, Residents and the Community to make this way of working a success. More to follow within the Year.

Sinfin and Hollybrook carers

Sinfin and Hollybrook carers received some tackling inequalities funding in 2020 to help them support members of their group to be active during the pandemic. This funding was sourced with support from Move More, Active Derbyshire and Sinfin Community Centre and since then we have been supporting the carers group to create opportunities for their members. This has culminated in the group taking part in a range of different activities over the last 6-9 months including group walks at parks around Derby and PSI chair-based exercise classes at Tiptoe school of dance on Sinfin Commerical park. In addition, the funding has helped the group create a monthly newsletter and provide phone counselling for carers.

The activities have proven very popular and successful with the group, in September 2021 3 volunteers undertook walk leader training with the Council's Livewell team and we have been trialling a bi-weekly Spring walk schedule for the carers group. As the group have only been doing the PSI chair-based exercise classes once every 3 weeks, several of the group have started attending the Move More supported PSI class held at the same venue every Wednesday morning.

Sinfin Moor Park

As many of you will be aware the new perimeter path at Sinfin Moor Park has now been completed and there is some outdoor equipment still to be installed (as this report is written on 18/02). There are now also plans to install a PING outdoor table tennis table near to pavilion, this table has been funded through Table Tennis England. We are planning to hold a small launch event for the outdoor table tennis table on Saturday 23rd April 11am – 1pm to coincide with the café being open, the Move More team has a number of bats and balls which we plan to make available for free to the public from the park café on a Saturday morning and from Sinfin Library. We are exploring other venues in Sinfin where these bats and balls could be made available from and also intend to provide interested local groups with their own allocation.



One new activity which is making the most of the new path at Sinfin Moor Park is a monthly buggy walk led by staff from Sinfin Children's Centre following some informal walk leader training delivered by Move More in July 2021. These free walks take place on the first Tuesday of every month (next walk 1^{st} March) 1:30-2:30pm, for more information or to book a place contact Sinfin Children's Centre on 01332 956967.

The Derby Walking Festival is due to take place again this year between Sunday 1st May and Sunday 26th June, plans are being put in place to allow more in person walks after they were quite restricted for the 2021 festival which consisted of mainly virtual or self-guided walks. I will send more information through to the board about the festival as it is available.

Ozzy Wheels

The new BMX track at Osmaston Park officially opened on Saturday 30th October and since then we have been supporting the Ozzy Wheels group in working towards formally establishing themselves as a club. The group are due to hold their first formal meeting on Thursday 3rd March to approve their constitution and elect committee members with a view to affiliating as a club with British Cycling shortly afterwards.

Another open event has been planned for the Osmaston Park BMX track on Saturday 16th April 11am – 3pm to launch the start of weekly coached sessions at the track by the club. Final details for both the event and sessions are being worked on and once we have everything confirmed I will update the board and partners further.

Sinfin CYP Network

Since the last Neighbourhood Board we have held some site visits through the Sinfin CYP Network to consider ways we could work with local residents and young people to improve 3 identified spaces; Sinfin Lane Recreation Ground, the visual appeal of the Rocket Park play area on Shakespeare Street and the small area of green space at the junction of Shakespeare Street and Sinfin Lane. We are in the process of putting together a plan for some short, medium and long-term improvements that have been suggested or identified for these spaces. In addition to this work we have engaged Cottons Farm primary school in the network and plan to speak with their students in the near future to identify what is important to them in Sinfin.

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
Derby Youth Engagement Service

Throughout the winter months, the presence of inclement weather has not deterred the young people from coming together and enjoying positive diversionary activities. The ability to use portable lighting to 'brighten communities' has aided our success in Sinfin with young people being encouraged to try a range of new sports and play games, such as hockey and tennis. The young people have reiterated how they feel reassured in the ability to engage with opportunities during the winter months as they can often find the darker nights tedious which could lead to incentives being clear towards toxic behaviour involvement.

Throughout the last couple of months, we have worked with young people to find out what they enjoy about the sessions, what they feel should be changed, and the benefits that the sessions are having on their personal growth and development. The collection of such qualitative information has demonstrated that young people value the sessions that take place in their community; contributing to their social engagements, skillsets, and overall wellbeing. The statistics indicate that whilst there are some improvements to be made in regards to bringing young people tögether to improve teamwork and communication skills, the sessions are effective in channeling negative behaviours and attitudes, as well as enabling young people to work together to support the wellbeing of all.











The overall attendances from the period 3/11/21 to 9/2/22


