Comment

The savings shown in the examples are improvements on the original proposals. However, it needs to be borne in mind that for some Roman Catholic families this is entirely new household expenditure.

*The **Original** proposals for 2008 had a lower and higher amount based on age of child and distance involved

£320 each year for **primary** age pupils Aged 4-7 <2miles from school and

Aged 8 - 11 < 3 miles from school:

£350 each year for primary age pupils

Aged 4 – 7 2+ miles from school and

Aged 8 – 11 3+ miles from school

£420 each year for secondary age pupils

Aged 11 - 16 < 3 miles from school:

£500 each year for secondary age pupils

Aged 11 – 16 3+ miles from school

The **Final** proposals have one rate for primary and one rate for secondary.
