

Report of the Strategic Director of Children and Young People

Review of Regional Framework for External placements

SUMMARY

- 1.1 This paper provides an overview of the changes regarding the East Midlands Regional framework, which is the principle mechanism for sourcing placements for children where there is no identified in-house provision that can meet the child's needs.
- 1.2 The framework is due to end in November 2015, and a review of its effectiveness has been undertaken.
- 1.3 The number of placements Derby is sourcing externally has increased, which is impacting the overall cost of placements.
- 1.4 A flexible approach to sourcing may enable Derby to achieve better value for money.

RECOMMENDATION

- 2.2 To support the consideration of a range of options for sourcing, including a revised framework for schools and specialist options.

REASONS FOR RECOMMENDATION

3.1 The current framework for external placements will change.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

4.1 Children and Young People services currently use two main types of carers for placements for young people; in-house foster carers, and carers with Independent Fostering Agencies (IFAs). Placements are always sought with in-house carers prior to considering IFAs.

- 4.2 Since 2011, Derby City has been part of the East Midlands Regional Framework for sourcing external placements. Six out of the nine East Midlands LAs use this framework, which was established to enable consistency, comparison and transparency between different agencies and Local Authorities (LAs) and enable LAs to benefit from economies of scale in contracting, quality monitoring and support costs.
- 4.3 Derby City has seen the advantages of a common approach. However, the current framework is due to end in November 2015, and a revised regional proposal is being developed.
- 4.4 The Local Authorities who do not use this framework generally use either spot purchase and/or block contracting arrangements.

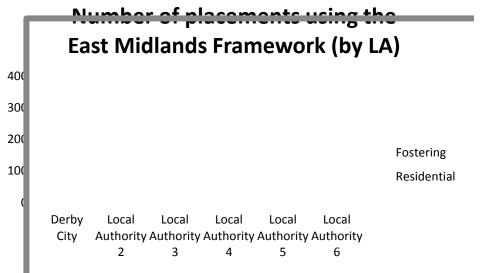
4.5 Framework Use

Over the last three years, demand for placements across the region through the framework has risen.

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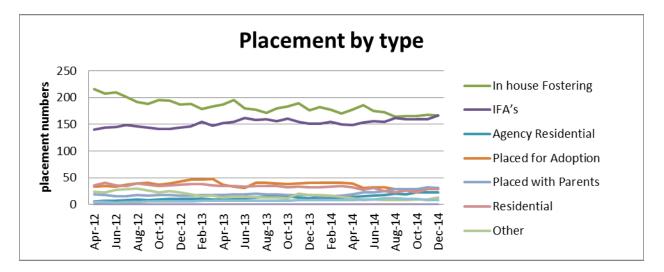

4.6 Whilst Derby City make a significant number of placements via the Framework, numbers are not as high as other LAs:

4.7 However, as the number of external placements made by Derby City relative to inhouse placements is rising, and the cost of external placements are more expensive than in-house, the total cost of placements is rising.



- 4.8 In order to fill a gap in the market for specialist placements, a pilot for provision of specialised fostering placements for young people who would otherwise be remanded into custody, commenced February 2014 (Remand Fostering Pilot). Whilst only a few placements have been made, the ability to work differently has provided opportunities as should continue to be considered.
- 4.9 Young people aged 16+ can also be placed through the Housing Framework, which has recently been tendered (September 2014), providing alternative supported accommodation options.

4.10 Future ways of working

As the framework is due to end, the following areas have been considered:

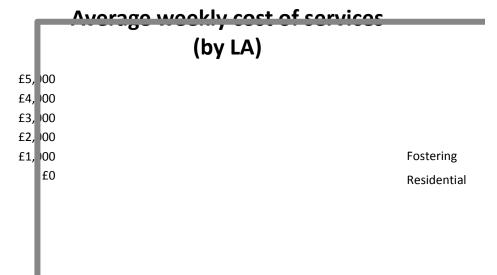
4.11 **1)** Alternative options for regional collaboration, for example:

- No regional agreements or
- Regional agreement for all East Midlands local authorities or
- Mixed economy with some regional agreements.
- 4.12 Whilst Derby has benefitted from regional agreements, the ease of availability of placements may also have been a contributory factor to the increase in external placements/decrease in in-house placements. Derby also contributes to the cost of the regional team who set up and quality assures providers.

4.13 **2)** Whether the framework achieves best value/quality:

• Opportunities to improve the current contracting arrangements for fostering and residential have been identified.

 Comparisons have been undertaken to determine whether external placements procured through the framework are sourced at a lower cost than those external placements secured through either spot purchase/block contracts (non-Framework LA);

4.17 Whilst a number of discounts are secured from the framework, 'total' costs are not always comparable. It is recommended a mix of sourcing options be considered.

4.18 **3)** Whether the scope of placements covered needs to change:

Going forward, specialist therapeutic (residential) placements, and specialist school placements (see 4.19 below) have been identified as areas with high demand/spend, and are being considered for inclusion in a revised framework;

4.20 **Proposed approach**

4.16

A Regional Project Manager is currently being recruited. It is envisaged revised specifications will be developed (by April 2015) with new contracts commencing November 2015.

- 4.21 Challenges for Derby include:
 - The increasing complexity of young people, where numbers of complex placements have risen from 18 to 60 during the last three years for the six local authorities in the current regional framework contract,
 - Consideration of increasing in-house provision enabling a reduced reliance on the external market,
 - Balancing payments and rewards for stability,
 - The ability to enter into a similar arrangement with independent schools, who have different placing criteria to that of LAC, and
 - The financial implications of a revised framework, where prices have been held consistently for the duration of the framework.
