Children Looked After Health: Sexual Health And Personal Relationships Policy

RECOMMENDATION

1. To adopt the Sexual Health and Personal Relationships for Young in Public Care Policy for Social Services staff.

REASON FOR RECOMMENDATIONS

2. This report presents the Sexual Health and Personal Relationship Policy for Young People in Public Care (Appendix 2). This is part of the Policy, Procedure and Practice Guidance for Promoting the Health of Children Looked After, which was approved by Policy Committee on 17 October 2001.

SUPPORTING INFORMATION

- 3.1 The Sexual Health and Personal Relationships Policy identifies that children and young people in public care are particularly vulnerable to a high teenage pregnancy rate and may not be equipped with skills to develop and maintain healthy personal relationships. This has an impact on a child's ability to achieve in other areas of their life.
- 3.2 The attached Policy details the actions that social care staff and managers will take to make sure the sexual health needs of children in public care are met (Policy, Section 3). Consultation with these young people is referenced in the Policy.
- 3.3 The Policy highlights that this is not a 'one off' event but a process that takes into account the age and understanding of a child and can be provided for in a variety of ways (Policy, Section 5).
- 3.4 The Policy highlights that children and young people will receive sex and relationship education in different settings in school, from their parents, from health staff, social care and youth workers.
- 3.5 In the Policy there is clear guidance on the legal aspects of providing sex and relationship information (Policy, Section 4). This includes issues of confidentiality, the Fraser Guidelines on giving contraception advice for health professionals and sexuality issues.
