Joined Up Care Derbyshire Provider Collaborative Update

Purpose

1.1 This report and accompanying slides provide an update on the development of the provider collaborative within the Joined Up Care Derbyshire Integrated Care System (JUCD ICS).

Recommendation

2.1 To note the update from the JUCD provider collaborative.

Reason

3.1 To ensure that the Health and Wellbeing Board is informed of, and engaged with, the development of the provider collaborative within JUCD, ensuring alignment and joint effort as necessary on shared priorities

Supporting information

- 4.1 As noted in previous reports to the HWB, ICSs are statutory bodies bringing together health organisations and wider partners with responsibility for the planning and delivery of health services for a defined population. ICS across England came into being on the 1st July 2022, including NHS Derby and Derbyshire ICS, which is comprised of an Integrated Care Board and an Integrated Care Partnership.
- 4.2 The structure of the JUCD ICS reflects national guidance on ICS development including the development of Provider Collaboratives and Place partnerships which are integral parts of the JUCD structure.
 - Place-based partnerships are collaborative arrangements formed by the organisations responsible for arranging and delivering health and care services in a locality or community. It is intended that there will be two Place partnerships: one for the city, one for the county.
 - Provider collaboratives are partnership arrangements involving at least two trusts working at scale across multiple places, with a shared purpose and effective decision-making arrangements. The national guidance on provider collaboratives can be accessed via the following link:

- 4.3 Within Derby and Derbyshire NHS providers have a long history of working in partnership. A more formal approach to collaboration has been developing over the past eighteen months as part of the transition to the new statutory ICS. This development has included the formation of a Provider Collaborative Leadership Board, which initially met in 'shadow' format prior to the changes to the ICS statutory structures in July 2022.
- 4.4 The JUCD provider collaborative formally includes the following organisations:
 - Chesterfield Royal Hospital NHS Foundation Trust
 - Derbyshire Community Health Services NHS Foundation Trust
 - Derbyshire Healthcare NHS Foundation Trust
 - Derbyshire Health United (Community Interest Company)
 - East Midlands Ambulance Service
 - United Hospitals of Derby and Burton NHS Foundation Trust.
- 4.5 In addition to the above providers, the Derby and Derbyshire GP Provider Board are represented within the collaborative and attend the Leadership Board meetings.
- 4.6 Local authority representatives from both Derby City Council and Derbyshire County Council have been invited to attend, but at present their involvement has been largely focussed on the JUCD Integrated Place Executive.
- 4.7 The accompanying presentation gives some further information about the development of the JUCD provider collaboration, its purpose, strategic aims, current position and future plans.

Public/stakeholder engagement
