ILACS background

- Part of a 'whole-system approach' to inspections
- Authorities can be assessed via a short or standard inspection
- Key lines of enquiries (KLOEs) are informed by annual conversations and focused visits
- Inspections focus on the effectiveness of local authority services and arrangements in relation to:
 - how our practice helps and protects children;
 - the experiences and progress of children in care wherever they live, including those children who return home;
 - our arrangements for permanence for children who are looked after, including adoption; and
 - the experiences and progress of care leavers.



Short inspections – three key questions



Has the **quality and impact of practice been maintained**?



Are there any areas where the **quality and impact of practice have improved**?



Are there any areas where the **quality and impact of practice have deteriorated**?



Inspectors will **be focusing on social workers'** <u>direct practice</u> with families by:

- scrutinising and discussing a sample of children's cases alongside discussions with practitioners working with the child or young person
- where possible and appropriate,
 having meetings with children,
 young people, care leavers,
 parents and carers, foster carers
 and adopters
- shadowing staff in their day-to-day work
- where possible and appropriate,
 observing practice in multiagency/single-agency meetings or,
 more likely, parts of meetings
