IMPLICATIONS

Financial and Value for Money

1.1 The cost of providing the Adoption Service is contained within fixed cost-centre budgets. In the event of an appeal to the IRM the cost falls on the adoption service provider. The fee is around £2500 for each case.

Legal

2.1 The adoption function of the Council is regulated by the 1989 Children Act and the Associated Adoption Regulations, guidance and the minimum standards published in 2014

Personnel

3.1 The service became managed by a Head of Children in Care, Regulated Services in February 2013 which brought the fostering, adoption and children homes services under the management of a single manager. A Deputy Head of Service, Fostering and Adoption, 1.5 whole time equivalent team managers and 10.4 whole time equivalent social workers carry out the full range of adoption activities.
