The Children's Rights Service – Annual Report 2018/19

Purpose

- 1.1 There is a statutory requirement to provide a Children's Rights Service for children in care. The annual report outlines service provision, take up and relevant issues for consideration by the members of Corporate Parenting Committee

Recommendation

- 2.1 To consider content of report and make appropriate recommendations

Reason

- 3.1 As part of our contract there is a requirement for the service to provide an annual report. This is an important statutory service for children in care.

Supporting information

Children in Care Council Summary

The annual report provides information about how Change, Grow and Live (CGL merged with SOVA in March 2019) have provided independent advocacy and independent visitor services.

CGL have continued to work hard to recruit volunteers over 2018/19. They currently have 55 advocates involved in their service. They continue to recruit, train and support their advocates to provide a good service

Over the year CGL advocacy have provided help and support 71 issue based referrals, a rise of 14% on the previous year, when there were 62. 41% were from children and young people placed outside of Derby.

Advocates have a monthly clinic in each of the residential homes so young people can speak to the advocates. 10% of referrals were self-generated through this way.

CGL also provide advocacy to help young people get their views across at the initial child protection conferences. These are children that still live at home. This has worked well over the year and continued to grow. In 2018-19 CGL supported 78 children/young people to participate in 56 separate conferences.

It has been agreed with CGL that they should at least provide 40 independent visitor matches to young people in care. At the end of the year there were 38 matches. Young people who live a way from Derby and who do not have any regular contact with family or friends are given priority for independent visitor matches.

- 4.1 Provision of the Children's Rights Service is enshrined in legislation for looked after children through the Children Act 1989 and through related regulation and guidance. The Council has a statutory duty to provide advocacy services for looked after children making complaints and to appoint independent visitors.

The Children's Rights Service in Derby is made up of 3 services and from the 1st April 2017 it has been delivered by SOVA¹ (Now CGL) the services include;

- The Independent Visitor Service
- The Independent Advocacy Service for all children in care (Since January 2018 this has been expanded to include children who are privately fostered)
- Independent Advocacy at Child Protection Conference

- 4.2 Since starting the contract for children rights service on 1st April 2017, CGL has worked hard to develop partnerships and provide quality children's rights service. In 2018/19 SOVA have received 71 advocacy referrals, which covered a range of themes:

- Support to prepare for looked after child reviews
- Support during looked after reviews
- Placement
- Support to attend court proceedings
- Support to liaise with leaving care workers
- Support to meet with school/education
- Other

Advocacy in child protection conferences has continued to be provided and over 2018/19 78 young people were supported to participate in over 56 separate conferences.

In January 2018 SOVA agreed to provide independent advocacy to children that are privately fostered. There are a small number of children that are privately fostered.

There were 38 Young People Matched with Independent visitors at the end 2018-19, the longest running match is in its sixth year. 26 referrals were received on behalf of

young people and made 21 new matches.
