# EIA for Proposed Ending of Service Contracts for Targeted Sexual Health Promotion/Education: Impact on Equality Groups

The services affected by proposed changes are primarily targeted at groups of people/communities with protected characteristics under the Equality Act 2010. Due to the nature of these services, it is likely that there may be an impact on at least one or more of the Equality Groups. Organisations potentially affected may also deliver other services that are not commissioned by Derby City Council. The ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education may therefore potentially affect the provider's ability to deliver those services not commissioned by Derby City Council.

This document summarises the impact that potential ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education would have on each specific Equality Group. This has been done by:

- Looking at the service according to the support provided to the main Equality Group
- If a service provides a significant level of support for a second Equality Group then it will be listed under both Equality Groups
- Capturing the impact that ending of Derby City Council service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education will have on Equality Groups accessing other services provided by the affected organisation but not commissioned by Derby City Council.

## Scale of any negative impact:

Based on the budget proposals set out in the public consultation, the ending of service contracts for targeted sexual health promotion/education are likely to have a negative impact on people from the identified Equality Groups. The extent of this impact will depend on any mitigating action taken by the Council or organisation affected.

Derbyshire Positive Support has explicitly stated that the ending of the Derby City Council service contract would destabilise the charity significantly and in turn, it would no longer be financially viable for the charity to continue. This would therefore also result in the charity being unable to deliver services commissioned by other organisations.

	with HIV has increased significantly and Derbyshire Positive Support expect that there will be an ongoing demand and increasing number of older people in			

Derby requiring support, advice, education and access to these services in the future. Loss of this service has the potential to increase strain on existing adult social care services, reduce access to advice, support and education for those people living with HIV and impact on broader health & wellbeing.

In line with the growing number of older people living with HIV, Derbyshire Positive Support also offerspecialist training and educationfor carers and residential/nursing home staff around HIV awareness, reducing stigma/discrimination and medication requirements. This is provided on an ad hoc basis. Derbyshire Positive Support are aiming to work with residential/nursing homes in the future to produce standards for providing care to those people living with HIV and there are no other organisations able to offer the same level of specialist expertise to input into this process. HIV is considered a disability at the point of diagnosistherefore loss of this specialist knowledge may increase the risk of a potential breach in equality duties for those residential/nursing homes providing care for those living with HIV.

# Derbyshire Positive Support

#### **Babies & Young Children**

Derbyshire Positive Support provides a free formula milk service for mothers living with HIV who are on low incomes, in order to reduce the risk of HIV transmission from mother to child through breastfeeding. NHS guidelines support the use of formula milk for babies and children of mothers living with HIV, howeverrestrictions mean that this is not available on NHS prescription. Loss of this service has the potential to increase the risk of HIV transmission to the children and babies of those mothers with HIV on low incomes who rely on the service provided by Derbyshire Positive Support and cannot afford to buy formula milk.

Derbyshire Positive Support providefacilities and space for the young people and children of parents with HIV who need advice and support but may feel intimidated by a clinical setting. This is delivered in conjunction with the Derby Subsidised by

Derbyshire Positive Support also highlight the potential negative impact from loss of specialised HIV health promotion, awareness and educational services, which may result in additional costs being incurred by health services as a result of late diagnosis, onward transmission, medicines management issues and management of related or associated conditions, such as, tuberculosis.

Derbyshire Positive Support's community based and outreach services provide improved access to specialist HIV advice, support, education and awareness. This contributes to a decrease in stigma, isolation and marginalisation for service users and reduces the risk of associated mental health issues, such as depression. People living with HIV often don't access GP/primary care services due to lack of understanding about HIV. Derbyshire Positive Support provides an advocacy hub and expert reference service for those people living with HIV and loss of this service would impact on those people with a disability, who wouldneed to travel out of area toaccess an equivalent service (the nearest equivalent service is located in Staffordshire). This would increase isolation and the potential for sexually risky behaviour as a result of not being able to access relevant specialist advice and education services.

Derbyshire **Positive** Support

Derbyshire Positive Support provides enhanced services for those people with HIV who have mental health issues. This includes a '3 way contract' to improve medication monitoring, adherence and safe & well checks. This is delivered in collaboration with local NHS services and loss of this would potentially increase the likelihood of those service users leading 'chaotic lifestyles' with increased costs for associated health and social care services.
