## Patient Choice

Patient Choice is being improved in the NHS and more and more patients will be able to choose where they want to go to for their care. For some areas, such as orthopaedics and eye surgery, patients can choose from four or five places including both NHS and independent hospitals or treatment centres.

When you visit your GP or optician about orthopaedics or eye care and they decide you need to be referred to a specialist, they will send your details to a new Southern Derbyshire Patient Choice Centre. A Patient Choice Advisor will contact you and discuss which hospital or treatment centre you want to go to for your care. They will be able to tell you:

- which hospitals or treatment centres you can choose from
- how to get to each place and information about parking
- what the waiting time is at each of the places
- what other services are offered.

The Patient Choice Advisor will also be able to answer other non-medical questions to help you choose which hospital or treatment centre to choose. You may want to be close to home or prefer to go somewhere with a shorter waiting time – the choice is yours.

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You don't have to decide immediately and can ask the Advisor to call you back when you've had the chance to chat with family/friends about it. Once you have decided your referral will be passed to the hospital or treatment centre you chose and they will get in touch with you to arrange an appointment.

This sort of choice is only available for some treatments at the moment, but is being rolled out across the NHS so that eventually there will be a choice for all sorts of treatments.

### **Walk in Centre on the way**

Central and Greater Derby Primary Care Trusts are working with Derby Hospitals Foundation Trust to design and build a Walk in Centre on the Derbyshire Royal Infirmary site. NHS Walk in Centres are designed to provide quick access to health promotion and advice and treatment for minor ailments. The Centre will initially be open from 7am to 9pm every day.

The Walk in Centre will also be home to GP services including the out of hours service which is currently located on Duffield Road. Social Services will also re-locate some of the reception and screening services currently based at St Mary's Gate and the Careline – out of hours services, to provide a 24 hour assessment service from the Derby Walk in Centre. There is also scope to include voluntary and community groups within the building.

This arrangement provides an opportunity to be innovative and create a centre that brings together health and social services, 24 hours a day. More information about the Walk in Centre will be available as plans are firmed up.
